The situation was becoming serious. He certainly held the floor and seemed likely to keep it. All sorts of plans were tried to get him to stop, but eloquence poured from him as water from a mountain spring. He was not allowed to halt for food, though he was permitted to drink.

The speaker insisted on keeping to the question before the House and objected to him repeating himself. Through the watches of the night De Cosmos talked on and successfully evaded all traps of "order." He went manfully on with his speech as the

Councillors Ellis, Cowan, Kennedy, Martin and Collier were present at the regular weekly meeting of the City Council held Thursday evening.

A. Hennebery's offer to supply cement will be kept on file for reference.

The claim of Mrs. John Quigley for land taken for widening road on Pleasant Street will be enquired into.

The caretaker of the Park reports that a new fence is necessary on Bannerman Road. The Park Committee will consider the matter.

A note was received from Baine Johnston & Co. saying that they had complied with the Council's request in reference to waste water.

W. J. Kennedy, of Carbonear, wrote the Council offering beach rocks and gravel and 1,000 tons of quarry spawls. The Secretary was ordered to inform him that they do not want any just now.

St. Michael's Church Warden asked to have the light there removed to the top of the pole. Councillors Martin and Collier will attend to it.

The Gas Co. asked permission to cross the Promenade with loads of coal. They also want a recognition of a right of way that they had there in olden times. Referred to Solicitor.

Plans of houses were from J. T. Martin, Sebastian Street; Joseph Soper, Pennywell Road; S. Garrett, Barnes Road; T. A. Hall, Rennie's Mill Road; W. Butler and E. Pike, Pennywell Road, and F. W. Newbury, Pennywell Road.

The plans of Butler & McDonald were not signed as the ground in question will be appropriated by the Government.

A stone sewer will be made on Cochrane Street. Repairs will be made to Harvey Road.

Tenders will be invited for five horses also for quarry spawls. After the weekly reports were read the meeting was adjourned.

Holy Week at St. Michael's.
Holy Week was observed at St. Michael's Church in the usual devotional manner. On Maundy Thursday Holy Communion was administered at 8 a.m. in memory of the Institution of the Blessed Sacrament. Good Friday Matins were read at 10 o'clock followed by the Ante-Communion, including the Narrative of the Passion from St. John's Gospel. The Rev. J. Brinton was the preacher, and his theme was the responsibility of Pontius Pilate in crucifying Christ, from St. Matthew xxvii. 24: "I am innocent of the Blood of this just Man."

At Evensong the sermon was delivered by Rev. Jas. Bell from the text: "Greater love hath no man than this," and was chiefly an appeal for offerings on behalf of the Missions to the Jews.

Easter Sunday there will be three celebrations of the Holy Eucharist, viz., at 6.45, 8 and 11 o'clock a.m. Matins will be at 9.30. The Rev. G. H. Bolt will be the preacher in the morning.

More Smallpox at Channel.

A fresh case of small pox developed here yesterday, this time on a man from Cape Breton. The authorities promptly dealt with the situation by placing the subject in the hospital and putting the house where he lived under quarantine. The balance of the Harlaw's crew are to-day being transferred to an isolated schooner and will be kept on quarantine for the regular period. It is to be fumigated and disinfected from stem to stern, after which she will be allowed to proceed, probably to-night or tomorrow morning. These measures are the result of consultation between Doctors Grant, Brehm, Pater-son and Magistrate Squaire. The latter, aided by Dr. Grant, is taking every precaution to prevent an epidemic. No sealing news to-day.
