words concerning the Picnic held on  
Labour Day, September 2nd, under  
the auspices of the Newfoundland  
Catholic Association, of Whitney Pier,  
Sydney, C. B. To say that the affair  
was a success would be putting it  
mildly. The day opened under fav-  
ourable weather conditions and from  
early morning till late at night the  
Cape Breton's Electric Co.'s ferry  
boats were loaded with pleasure-  
seekers. They were not disappointed  
for a more ideal spot could not be  
found to spend the day set aside for  
the working man and his family.  
Point Edward on the North Side of  
Sydney Harbour, commands as it does  
an excellent view of the Harbours of  
Sydney, Sydney Mines, and North  
Sydney, together with the fresh sea  
breezes and the perfume of the  
country air, on every hand was to be  
met contented and smiling faces.  
After the short sea voyage of half an  
hour from Sydney the grounds were  
reached, where on landing we beheld

ours, Pink, White and Green, proudly  
floating side by side with the Union  
Jack of Old England which brought  
very strongly to our minds that we as

The principal events in the sports  
were a four-oared boat race between

olic Order of Foresters, the former  
winning by about three boat's lengths.  
The winning crew were:—John Doran,  
cox.; T. Butt, J. Walsh, James  
Fitzpatrick and P. Murphy. Now, Mr.  
Editor, I wish to say that this is a  
new sport in Sydney and it was not  
so good as we would wish to see it.  
As crews could not be got to compete  
in these races, but it marks the intro-  
duction of the sport so dear to New-  
foundlanders at home or abroad, and  
in the near future we hope to see it  
an annual event as it is in Newfound-  
land. The next item on the program  
was a tag-of-war between teams from  
the N. C. A. and the Foresters, the  
former team winning by four feet after  
a hard and exciting pull of four  
minutes. A closely contested foot-  
ball game in which the N. C. A. team  
was also victorious ended the sports,  
which were held under the patronage  
of Rev. Dr. O'Reilly, Honorary Vice-  
President and Organizer of the Associa-  
tion. The Rev. Dr. also spoke at  
some length concerning the Associa-  
tion and the good work it was doing in  
uniting Canadians and Newfoundlanders  
and helping to bring them under  
the bond of unity and friendship. A  
vote of thanks was rendered the  
ladies in charge of the dinner by the  
Rev. Dr. O'Reilly; the thanks of the  
Association were also given to the  
Foresters, C. M. B. A. and the public  
generally who by their patronage and  
co-operation so generously given made  
the affair such a success. The pro-  
ceeds amounting to \$300 go towards  
the funds of the Association, and now,

LONDON, Sept. 13.  
The War Office has issued a mem-  
orandum on the employment of air-craft  
in war. It points out that it cannot  
be doubted that airships and  
aeroplanes are invaluable in locating  
the enemy, and in obtaining informa-  
tion which otherwise could only be  
obtained by force, and that all the  
powers are expending money and en-  
ergy in the development of an air  
service which is certain to have an  
important effect on the future of Eu-  
ropean wars. It deals with details,  
and instructions for the use of air  
craft during the coming manoeuvres.  
The memorandum, which emphasises  
the fact that employment of these  
machines is quite experimental, points  
out that the present war in Tripoli,  
although it has given an impetus to  
aviation, has afforded no test because  
the Italians had the air to themselves.

VICTORIA, B. C., Sept. 13.  
That Canada shall without delay,  
proceed with the execution of a strong  
naval policy on the lines launched by  
Aulair, but further developed and ex-  
panded by the creation of an efficient  
Pacific unit, is British Columbia's ex-  
pectations, according to Premier McBride.  
In McBride's opinion the Asiatic  
 menace to Western Canada is much  
more serious than the German peril  
to England. He regards the German  
war scare as an exceedingly unfortu-  
nate and ill-advised exploitation. Mc-  
Bride says if the emergency arose and  
the Canadian Government voted thirty,  
forty or fifty millions of dollars to  
meet it, the people would approve of  
his action.

DRESDEN, Saxony, Sept. 13.  
The manoeuvres in Saxony of the  
German Imperial armies which began  
on Sept. 9th, ended to-day with victory  
for the invading army. The result in-  
dicates, in the opinion of military  
officers, the difficulty of conducting  
war with the German army present-  
ing two fronts. Emperor William, who  
was chief umpire of the military oper-  
ations, will now proceed to the naval  
manoeuvres in the North Sea. His  
Majesty will review a parade of the  
fleet off Heligoland on Monday.

NEW YORK, Sept. 13.  
A cable from London says that after  
years of almost complete paralysis,  
Joseph Chamberlain, whose mind has  
remained alert until now, is sinking  
fast, and the end may come any day.  
During the last five weeks he has  
ceased to take any interest in political  
events, lying in his bed, mentally and  
physically helpless.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 13.  
The United States Government is  
about to intervene at San Domingo.  
Warships will be dispatched at once  
to the island. Revolution has broken  
out which threatens foreign interests.
