Our Bureaucrats Do What They Like;

The Legislature has been providing some \$40.000 a year for the Encouragement of Agriculture. As is well known, the money is largely frittered away in ways which do not tend to the betterment of farming in the country. The policy of scientific training for our young farmers has been abandoned, and the policy of instituting experimental stations discentinued.


