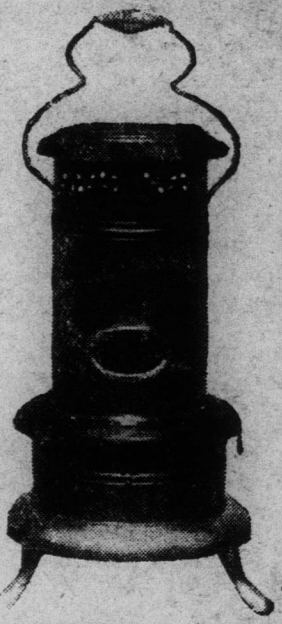

AFTER THE CONTEST.**What of the Future?**

It must be gratifying to the Leader of the Liberal Party, Sir Robert Bond, to have received the largest vote ever polled by any public man in this country, and to have beaten the leading man on the opposing team by two thousand five hundred and ninety-one votes. But, it is no doubt much more gratifying to him to find that a large majority of the voters throughout the country have registered themselves in favor of his Party and Policy. Out of the total number of votes polled in every district, except St. Barbe, the count of which is not yet to hand, Sir Robert Bond's Party received over sixty thousand votes, being some nine thousand, eight hundred votes over and above those polled for the present Government. Sir Robert Bond's manifesto awakes these people to a sense of danger. His message contained in fact a new

Declaration of Independence

against the despotism of plutocracy and government fraud. A new Proclamation of Emancipation from the tyranny of predatory wealth, to the end that a real Government by and for the people might be established in place of Government by and for a rich corporation, companies and grafters. The poll for the Opposition candidates indicates that the terrible experience of the past four years have brought about a correct, calm, and disingenuous public opinion; that the majority of the people no longer consider themselves made for the use or benefit of those who exercise the powers of government, but that government was established for the use and benefit of those governed; that they, despise pretence and hypocrisy, and discount success achieved by bluff and bluster, aided by ill-gotten gold and a subsidized section of the press.

Then why, it may be asked, have the present Government still the power to rule, contrary to the will of the majority of the people of the land?

The answer is not hard to find. It is because under the present distribution of seats in the House of Assembly, it was possible, by a combined effort on the part of the great majority of our Roman Catholic

friends, for the present Government to obtain twelve seats sure, and by manipulating the Roman Catholic votes in Protestant Districts to secure them sufficient support from these districts to hold on to power in defiance of the will of the majority of the electors of the land.

Where, may it be asked, does the remedy lie?

We reply, in a Redistribution Bill, that will give Roman Catholics and Protestants their proper share of representation in the House of Assembly.

At the present time Protestants have not their fair share of representation, and it will be the duty of the Opposition Party to see that they obtain it without delay.

The onus of refusing it, if it is refused, must be thrown upon Sir Edward Morris and his supporters in both branches of the Legislature. It is an anomaly, it is an injustice, that the Roman Catholic District of Ferryland with a population of only five thousand eight hundred should have TWO REPRESENTATIVES, while the Protestant District of Port de Grave, with a population of nearly seven thousand has only ONE REPRESENTATIVE, and the Protestant District of St. Barbe, with a population of over ten thousand has only ONE REPRESENTATIVE.

It is a further anomaly and injustice that while the Roman Catholic District of Harbor Main, with a population of only nine thousand four hundred has TWO REPRESENTATIVES, the Protestant District of Fortune Bay, with a population of nine thousand nine hundred has only ONE REPRESENTATIVE.

We might continue this comparison further, but at present we are only concerned in proving what we set out to prove, namely the unfair predominance of Roman Catholic influence in the representation of the House of Assembly, which in the present instance defeats the rule of the majority.

It may be asked why this anomaly was not adjusted before, and to such a query we reply, that the necessity did not appear until after the object lesson was presented in 1909, and was emphasized by the elections which have just terminated.

St. Barbe's First Count.

The Earl of Devon, Capt. Carter, arrived at Bonne Bay at 8.30 a.m. to-day with the ballot boxes of St. Barbe on board. At 10 o'clock the Returning Officer commenced the checking of the ballots and the returns of the deputies. About 1 p.m. this was finished and it was found there were 2179 ballots, which shows that 478 more ballots were cast in 1913 than in 1909. At 2 p.m. the count of the poll started.

TOKIO, To-day.
The Emperor to-day witnessed a review of fifty Japanese warships. The Emperor announced his intention of making a personal review of the entire fleet every year.

LONDON, To-day.
Militant suffragettes and arson and bomb troops were at work in several parts of the British Isles during last night and succeeded in doing considerable damage. Cactus House, Alexandra Park, Manchester, containing a collection valued at fifty thousand was badly wrecked by a bomb. Beg Brooks, a fine mansion near Bristol, was gutted by fire. A pavilion of the Bowling and Tennis Club at Catford, S. E. London, was burned down. At the scene of all outrages, quantities of suffrage literature and petroleum cans were found, no clue was obtained.

QUEENSTOWN, To-day.

The steamer Rappahannock brought into port the steamer South Point, from Philadelphia to London. The South Point's engines were crippled in a storm November 4th and sent out a wireless call for help. The Rappahannock picked her up next day.

LONDON, To-day.

Right Hon. Stanley Buckmaster was re-elected in the Keighley Division of Yorkshire West Riding in the by-election made necessary by his appointment to the position of Solicitor General in the three-cornered fight. He was opposed by the Unionist, Viscount Lascelles, 3852; and Mr. Bland, 3646. In the previous by-election in 1911, Buckmaster received 4667; Unionist and Labor candidates, 3842 and 3452 respectively.

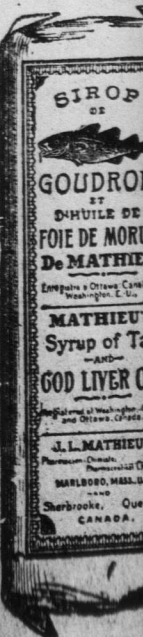
