How Plate Glass is Made

The cast plate-glass of which mir are made, is prepared from the whites sand, broken plate-glass, soda, a small proportion of lime, and a much smaller

The glass, when perfectly melted, is poured upon an iron table of the size required, and the thickness is regulated by a strip of iron placed down each of the four sides of the table. Immediately after it is poured out, the molten substance is flattened down by an iron roller, which lowers the glass to the thickness of the strips at the sides.
