He was wearing civilian clothes and the motive for his murder is unknown. He was shot with revolvers. The greatest military activity followed the killing of Constable Cullen, who was shot in the Falls Road early in the evening and died later. An official statement says since Feb 11 there have been 22 Catholies and 17 Protestants killed in Belfast, Since July 1921, the number of fatalities has been 120 Catholics and 42
