## House of Assembly.

**LITTLE BUSINESS DONE—ADJOURNED TILL TUESDAY.**

Practically no business was done at yesterday's session of the Legislature. In answer to question No. 1 on the Order Paper in relation to the Model Farm the Prime Minister informed Mr. Moore that the information was in course of preparation.

In answer to question No. 2 asked by Mr. Bennett, Hon. Mr. Jennings stated that an Election took place at Greenspond on February last and the necessary authority had been issued the Board.

Replying to a question by Mr. Bennett the Prime Minister stated that the Kero Light at Shoe Cove Pond near Greenspond, had been discarded and an electric light installed; therefore the services of Mr. Ethelred Carter were not required. He said he had no knowledge of any provision being made for Carter.

Mr. Bennett in reply stated that the treatment meted out to Carter was absolutely unfair and provision for him should be made.

The Prime Minister promised to have an enquiry into the case.

In reply to a question asked by Mr. Michael Cashin, the Prime Minister stated that from information supplied by the Deputy Minister of Customs he had learned that no firms whatever had passed entries at a lesser rate than 4.85% to the 5% tariff.

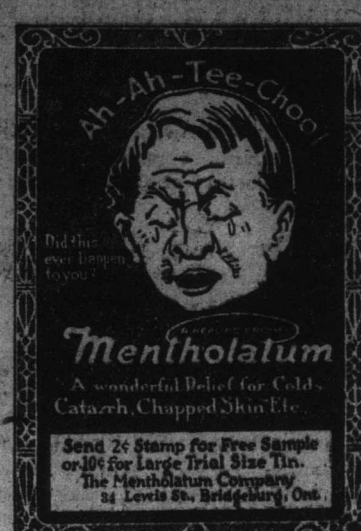
The Prime Minister speaking on the Income Tax resolutions outlined the original draft wherein there was discrimination in favor of corporations. The alterations now submitted had the concurrence of the Board of Trade, which was represented before the Committee of the House by Mr. A. J. Harvey. In the course of his explanation, the Prime Minister intimated that no further developments had occurred in relation to the railway, and in the absence of the Minister of Justice who was then attending to some personal business, he would say for him that the advice from the Government's legal advisers had not yet come to hand.

The resolutions were put through all its stages. According to the new reading, viz: "Corporations with incomes from \$2,000 to \$5,000 will be taxed five per cent, and on incomes over that amount the tax will be 8 per cent." It had been the intention in the original draft to put a tax of 10 per cent on incomes over \$2,000. The adjournment of the House until Tuesday next being moved by the Prime Minister.

Mr. J. R. McDonnell speaking to the motion stated the Government for the manner in which the business of the House was being conducted. Many of the members of both sides of the House had their affairs to attend to, yet they were called to meet when no business was ready. Instead of the game of passing the buck from one day to another, which the Government had been practicing so frequently of late, Mr. McDonnell thought that the Prime Minister should adjourn until June 12th, or such time as the Government was ready to proceed with business.

Mr. Walsh called the Prime Minister's attention to the fact that Kero Oil and Gasoline had advanced two cents per gallon within the past couple of days, and referred to circulars which the trade had issued after the lowering of the tariff. The trade circular had no sooner been sent out telling of a decrease in the selling price than the Imperial Oil Co. issued circulars stating that oil prices had advanced 2 cents per gallon. The Oil Company, according to figures submitted, were making a profit of nearly 100 per cent. There was a law on the Statute Book against profiteering and it should be put in effect. The Government, he said, should not permit a corporation to fleece the people. He advised the Government to do something during adjournment re this matter. Mr. Walsh also referred to the price the fishermen were charged for their oil. From the statement of cost he had prepared, the margin of profit was shown to be altogether unreasonable. He thought that taking off the duty on Kero Oil and Gasoline might encourage competition.

Mr. Michael Cashin suggested that if oil in hard wood barrels were put on the free list great benefit would accrue to the fishermen, as they would have packages in which to ship their cod oil. It would also be a check on the Oil Company that holds the monopoly of the commodity. If the Government were earnest in their desire to help

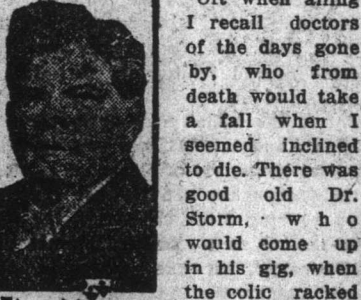


The fishermen they would take the duty off Kero Oil and Gasoline in wooden barrels. "Go back to what you did in 1920," said Mr. Michael. "The day is done that every schooner from Halifax and other ports coming home would bring along casks of oil." The House then adjourned until Tuesday next.

## A Revolution Travelling.

The recent threat of a railway strike brings to mind the fact that it was not until May 30, 1837, that the first passenger carrying railway was opened. Till then the only modes of conveyance were the canal, the fly wagon, and the coach—and the charges were proportionate to the speed. Only three coaches ran daily each way from Leicester and Nottingham. In addition to those that passed, and from more distant points, and on which little reliance could be placed by local travellers. So with goods—wool required quite two days to travel the fifteen miles between Leicester and Market Harborough a special price being charged because the distance was "so short and the traffic so unimportant." It frequently happened that conveyances were unable to carry the quantity of goods ordered. A woolstapler stated that he frequently had from two to five hundred bags of wool lying at Bristol which could not be brought forward by land, and he had to divide the bulk and send it by different routes, that which went by road occupied from seven to ten days in the transit, and that by water from three weeks to a month. Further west, the difficulties increased, so that goods from Plymouth had to come by sea to London, and were not infrequently a great length of time on the voyage and the land journey and often arrived in a wet and damaged condition. Such was the condition of affairs when the new era of travelling was inaugurated in 1825; and stupendous have been the revolutions that have since been silently and peacefully accomplished.
