Owing to the cold, only the dyed-in-wool fans turned out last night to see the game between the C. E. I. and the Pelicans. It was rather a colorless exhibition, the Pelicans having matters practically all their own way, though towards the end the red-and-whites made some desperate attempts to break through the defence of their opponents but without result. In the first half Duke Winter scored two goals, and in the final period Tommy Payne notched up another, leaving the Pelicans victors by 3 to 0.

The now famous tug-of-war team has accepted a challenge from the crew of the H. M. S. Valerian, and the test of their strength will be witnessed tomorrow at the War Vets Sports at St. George's Field. The navy lads have also promised very comic stunts to keep the spectators amused between the various events. Lieut. Mach of the Valerian has entered the 10 mile road race and will be pitted against Jimmy Jacobs, Taylor, Avery, Robertson, Kelly and Foley. Entries for all events do not close until tomorrow.

Nfld.'s champion, Jack Bell, leaves tonight by the Digby for Ireland, where he will represent the oldest colony in the Irish Olympic Games. It is Bell's intention to compete in the 4, 10, and full marathon; as there are four day's rest between each of these with the marathon last, he will not find the going arduous. He takes with him the best wishes of all for his success.

On the Iron Isle they have discovered a wonderful sprinter in the person of P. T. Murphy who has been cleaning up the 100, 220, and quarter. It is hoped he can be induced to enter the Championship Meet at the end of August. They also have two good half mile and one millers in Farrar and Farrell, so that our townies had better look out for themselves.

Jack Bell will have another chance at Macaulay who beat him last year at Halifax, for that progressive town is sending four representatives to the Irish Olympic of whom Macaulay is one. They are also sending Ern Smith the sprinter who beat our boys last year; Mooney a middle distance man, and Edward Healey the amateur boxing champion of Halifax. Although confined to athletes of Irish

descent yet Halifax sporting enthusiasts regardless of nationality are determined to have their town represented and the Provincial Government is assisting the fund—believing that if their men make good showing against athletes from all over the world that Halifax will be put on the map. A subscription list to defray the expenses has been opened and is being rapidly subscribed to. Yet, apparently all that St. John's is willing to do, is to send a sole representative.

In any case they know how to do things in Halifax, for in aid of the Child's Welfare Association there, their City Council have arranged an Athletic Show for July 15th at which the world's champion, Jack Dempsey will give an exhibition of boxing. It has been suggested that if the Committee in charge of securing the funds for Newfoundland representation in Ireland would get in touch with Halifax and have Dempsey come to St. John's, on one of the Red Cross boats and give an exhibition, they would secure enough funds to send a corps of athletes across. Apparently all Dempsey wants is his expenses. How about it, gentlemen?

Goes Far North.

SENEF WILL VISIT CAPE CHIDLEY

Sable I. at Wreck.

S.S. Sable I., which arrived in port this morning, was delayed on her last scheduled trip to North Sydney by calling at Point Platte, Little Miquelon, where the S.S. Canadian Commander lies stranded. The Sable I. saved a load of general cargo, consisting of sack flour and canned goods, in all 7,000 packages. The ship arrived at North Sydney on Sunday noon with her cargo. It is not improbable that the Canadian Commander will be saved. When the Sable I. left the wreck there were a number of small schooners around saving cargo.

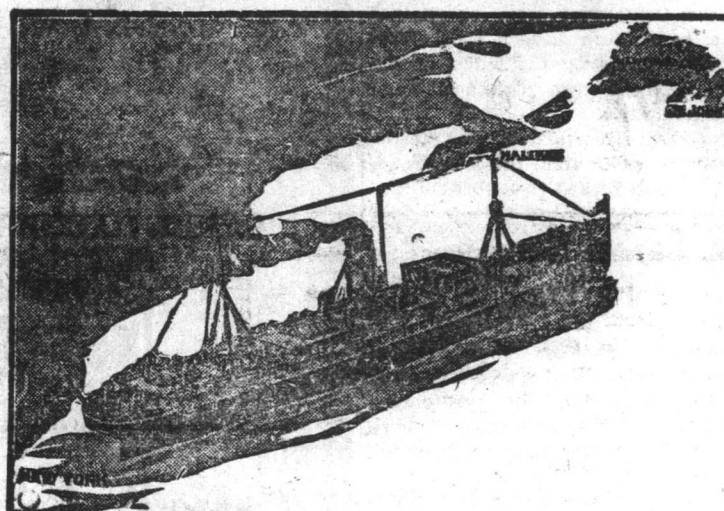
