#### LLOYD GEORGE AT LEEDS.

LEEDS, Oct. 22. A characteristic speech before a large audience on Saturday, Lloyd George defended his administration but refrained from revealing his programme. He spoke of the future of the Empire, but his plans are not yet disclosed. He promised that he would do nothing mean, and that he would play no part unworthy of the confidence placed in him by the people of this country.

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#### ASKING FOR LIBERAL HELP!

BOLTON, England, Oct. 22. The Earl of Derby who is expected to enter the Bonar Law Cabinet, took a conciliatory view of the political situation in addressing a Conservative meeting here yesterday. "The Coalition has come to an end but Coalition still lives. We must not forget that while we thought we made sacrifices for Coalition, our Liberal friends also made sacrifices." To pursue a vendetta against those with whom the Conservatives worked would be wrong and criminal, he asserted.

#### FORD WINS UNOFFICIAL RACE.

GLoucester, Oct. 21. The United States Challenger, Henry Ford, to-day defeated the Canadian Bluebonnet in the first race of the International Fishermen's series. The

#### NO RACE.

GLoucester, Oct. 23. Confirmation to-day, by the International Committee, through the Chairman, Wilfred C. Lufkin, of the sailing committee's ruling in calling off the opening contest, for the International Fishermen's Trophy, as no race, coming after twenty-four hours of furious controversy, has definitely cleared the way for resumption tomorrow of the series. Saturday's contest had got away to a poor start when it was found that the Henry Ford was spreading one hundred and

#### thirty-five feet more canvas than permitted under the rules. This mistake, made in recutting the sail, was rectified to-day. Through confusion at the beginning the vessels went away in the face of an official half hour postponement.

#### Committee, however, declared the race unofficial. The Bluebonnet turned the fourth mark in the official time of 3:53.40; the Ford turned the fourth mark at 3:44.20. The Bluebonnet was then a mile astern, the Ford had five miles to go to the finish on the port tack. The race was called unofficial by the judges because the vessels did not return to the starting point for a second point at the judge's request. The Ford beat the Bluebonnet by 12.41 minutes, unofficial time.

#### DR. ABBOT DEAD.

NEW YORK, Oct. 22. Dr. Lyman Abbott died to-day at his home here. (Rev. Dr. Lyman Abbott was Editor-in-Chief of the Outlook from 1893 to the time of his death. Born at Roxbury, Mass., in 1835, he was educated at New York University in 1856. He practiced law for three years after which he left the legal profession for the ministry, and since the spring of 1860 had been engaged in ministerial, literary and editorial work. His publications consisted chiefly of religious works, and included a biography of Henry Hand Beecher. Dr. Abbott married in 1857 and had four sons and two daughters. He will be a notable loss to the ecclesiastical and literary circle in which he moved.)

#### TWO RUSSIAN CRUISERS LOST.

RIGA, Oct. 22. The Russian armoured cruisers Rossi Ya and Grombol and several other vessels were lost in a storm in the Baltic yesterday.

#### DISORDERS IN VLADIVOSTOCK.

MOSCOW, Oct. 22. The United States cruiser Sacramento has arrived at Vladivostock. It is reported disorders are in progress in various parts of the town.

#### ADMIRAL HORSEY DEAD.

LONDON, Oct. 22. Admiral Sir Algernon de Horsey died at Cowes to-day aged ninety-five. (Admiral Sir Algernon de Horsey, K.C.B., was born in 1827. Joining the Navy, he served on the Coast of Syria in 1840. A quarter of a century later, he was senior naval officer during the Jamaica insurrection, and a year later, was in the same position during the Fenian Raids on the Lakes of Canada. From 1871-1875 he was Naval A.D.C. to Queen Victoria, and gave up that appointment to go as Commodore to the West Indies. In 1876 he was appointed Commander-in-Chief of the Pacific Fleet, and was responsible, while in the flagship Shah, for compelling the Peruvian rebel Iron-clad Huascar, to surrender to the Peruvian authorities. His action having been criticized in Parliament, Sir J. Holken, the Attorney General, said "The Huascar having committed acts which made her an enemy of Great Britain, de Horsey was justified in what he did." From 1894-95, Admiral de Horsey commanded the Channel Squadron, after which he was placed on the retired list in 1913, he has been Governor of the Isle of Wight. He married in 1861 and had one son, Admiral Spencer de Horsey, and two daughters. He has published several books on technical subjects.)

### The Boys' Survey and the Cigarette Nuisance.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir—I wish to congratulate the Rotarians on the organized effort which they are making this week to obtain valuable statistics in reference to the Boy Life of St. John's, and trust that it will bear fruit in some practical places for the benefit of the growing boys. One of the greatest evils facing the boys of tender years to-day is the cigarette habit. Hundreds of boys from 8 years up are

smoking cigarettes to-day, either secretly or openly and are undermining their health. The trainer of one of our college teams recently stated that his team had no chance in the college games in recent years owing to the cigarette habit, which lessened their endurance and the lads went to pieces individually after the first 15 or 20 minutes play. This would be a good opportunity to obtain the opinion of all parents as to the necessity of enforcing the cigarette law now on the Statute Book. Parents could state their views when asked to suggest how conditions may be improved for boys in St. John's. As the

father of a 12 year old boy I can suggest the argument of the cigarette law as one of the most important factors in improving conditions in the Boy Life of St. John's.
