In 1876 he was appointed Commanderin-Chief of the Pacific Feet, and was responsible, while in the flagship Shah, for compelling the Peruvian rebel Iron-clad .Huascar, to surrender "Windsor Patent"

to the Peruvian authorities. His action having been criticized in Parliament, Sir J. Holken, the Attorney General, said "The Huascar having committed acts which made her an enemy of Great Britain, de Horsey was justified in what he did." From I 1884-85, Admiral de Horsey commanded the Channel Squadron, after which he was placed on the retired list in 1913, he has been Governor of the Isle of Wight. He married in 1861 and had one son, Admiral Spencer de Horsey, and two daughters. He
