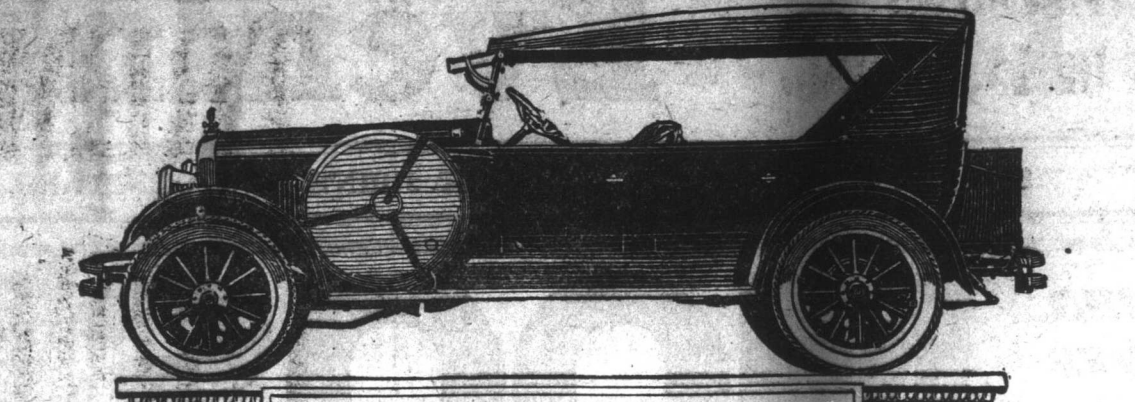
LED ASTRAL.

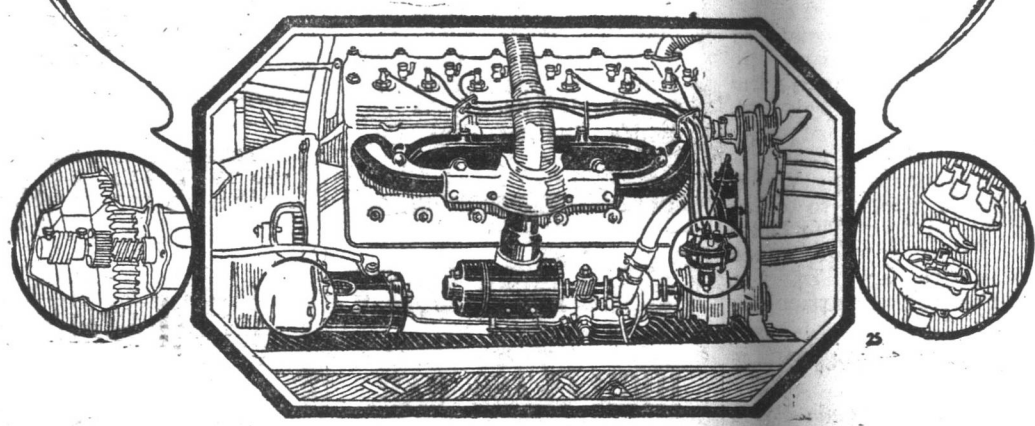

French Revenue Shows an Increase

State revenue from all sources in France during the month of June totalled 2,122,133,000 francs and showed an improvement of 165,522,000 francs over the preceding month's collection, according to official figures just received by the Bankers Trust Company of New York from its French Information Service. This improvement was especially noticeable in the yield from normal and permanent taxes which rose from 1,700,659,000 francs in May to 2,001,173,000 francs in June.

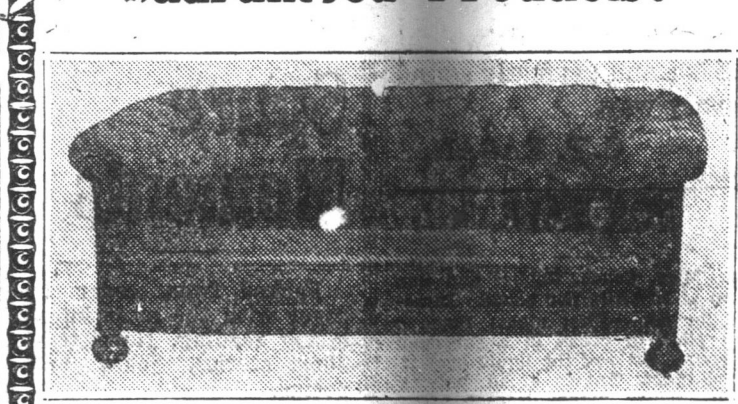
For the first six months of this year, revenue from normal sources aggregated 11,759,533,000 francs and showed an increase of 2,514,267,000 francs over revenue for the same period last year. This rise in yield can be attributed in part to the recently voted increase of 20 p.c. in all existing taxes.

The above mentioned figure of 2,001,173,000 francs representing normal revenue for last June, can be subdivided into the following categories:

1. Revenue from direct taxation which yielded 523,450,000 francs and showed an increase of 346,910,000 francs over the amount collected in June, 1923;
2. Revenue from State property, 13,602,000 francs, showing an increase of 1,192,000 francs over June, 1923;
3. Revenue from indirect taxes and Government monopolies which aggregated 1,464,121,000 francs, or 188,501,000 francs more than in the same month last year.

The very considerable increase in revenue from direct taxes is largely due to belated payments received on behalf of previous years' assessments. These payments are accelerated by the government's recent decision to charge interest on all arrears.
