INTERIM SESSIONS. The Kelly Larceny Case,

HE PLEADS GUILTY. Wm. H. Kelly was brought up this donald for trial on a charge of entering the store of Wm Stewart, Wyndham St., between the 6th and 9th of January last, and stealing therefrom several pieces of silk, the property of the said William Stewart. Mr. Peterson, County Attorney appeared for the prosecution along with Mr Geo. Palmer, and Messrs Macdonald & Oliver for the defence.

After the charge was read, Mr. A. H. Macdonald, Counsel for the prisoner, said he was instructed by his client to withdraw his plea of not guilty, and to plead guilty. He did so of his own free will, and without the advice of his Counsel. He feels he is guilty, and is willing to bear the punishment which the Court awards. Under the circumstances he (Mr Macdonald) would ask the permission of the Court to present a petition in favour of leniency of sentence. the prisoner's first offence, and he had hitherto borne a good character for hones-

hitherto borne a good character for honesty. He presumed the Court would not pass sentence at present, but would take time to consider, and give an opportunity for for the petition being presented.

His Honour shid that under the circumstances he would not pass sentence now. There were different kinds of larcenies, and he would have to examine the depositions before he could arrive at a just estimate of the case. He would, of course, receive any petition which might be presented in favor of the prisoner, and would remand him until tomorrow, at noon, when he would pronounce sentence.

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
