RAPID GROWTH OF CARLESTADT TOWN Has Now About Thirty Places of Business and Population of 300

DISTRICT HAS FINE CLASS OF SETTLERS Property in Town Has Tripled in Value in Past Three Months

(By J. N. McDonald) Carlestad, May 9.—The new town of Carlestad is located on the main line of the Canadian Pacific railway, 14 miles from Medicine Hat.
