The demonstration was a revelation of many valuable secrets of the cuisine. Chef Hold and Chef Cooper, who prepared several bushels of Saratoga chips in the kitchen, explained to a number of interested women the fine potential. terested women the fine points of the process, laying especial stress on the necessity of thoroughly chilling the slices of potato before cooking, to pre-vent toughness. Head Baker Elmer, the German expert who presides over the imported Dutch ovens, presented the recipes for French and raisin breads, on request, and demonstrated his success with rolls.
