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MOUNT PLEASANT.

Annual Meeting of the Cemetery Company—Officers Appointed for 1889.

The annual meeting of the Mount Pleasant Cemetery Company was held yesterday afternoon, there being present Messrs. P. Mackenzie (president), Thos. Green, J. M. Denton, H. Mathewson, H. C. Symonds, John Green, S. McBride, R. J. C. Dawson, and others.

The directors' report was presented by Mr. Mackenzie as follows: Gentlemen—Your directors herewith present the fifteenth annual report of the company with the usual only audited statement from the Treasurer of the receipts and disbursements.

The past year may be characterized as a good average year, there being an increase in the number of lots sold and interments as compared with the year preceding, and your directors, consistent with maintaining the grounds in proper order, endeavored to exercise the strictest economy, and out of the income from the sale of lots and the interest on the mortgage of \$1,000 and the increased salary of the caretaker.

There has been a marked improvement in the appearance of the grounds during the year, due in great measure to the extra care and skill bestowed on the pruning and dressing of trees and shrubs, and removal of weeds and grass, and the increased number of plants and flowers for the beautification of the grounds.

The Board desire to express their entire approval of the manner in which the caretaker and the employees under him have discharged their duties.

Mr. Dawson moved, seconded by Mr. Mackenzie, that the directors' report and statement be received and adopted.

The appointment of officers was then proceeded with as follows: Auditors, Messrs. J. H. Brown and J. C. Dawson; Secretary, Messrs. R. J. C. Dawson and John Green; following directors were appointed: P. Mackenzie, Thomas McCormick, Alex. Johnson, Green, J. M. Denton, Jas. M. Cowan, Wm. Gordon, the vote being unanimous. A vote of thanks was passed to the President and Secretary and the meeting adjourned.

The directors then met, and re-appointed Mr. Mackenzie as president, Alex. Johnson as vice-president, and Mr. S. McBride as secretary for the year. Mr. Green was re-appointed Treasurer. The Executive Committee, consisting of the President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer, was re-appointed, with the addition of Mr. J. M. Denton.

Millers and Farmers.

To the Editor of the ADVERTISER: Having carefully watched the agitation, we find there are three questions upon which the millers and farmers disagree. 1. The proper toll for grinding a bushel of wheat by the roller process. 2. The propriety of asking the Government to increase the duty from 50 cents to \$1. The first question, as to the toll proper for grinding a bushel of wheat, the law allowing five pounds, or 'one-wheat,' was made into the Burr stone, but cannot apply to the new process, as it would cost the miller's Association say 7 or 8 cents per bushel. This question is a real one, and one that requires to be adjusted. I see no objection to the remedy proposed by the millers' Association, namely, two and a half cents per bushel, and when the committee shall ascertain the real cost and fix the rate. The House will then be asked to pass a bill in accordance therewith. This may at present appear to be against the millers, as the millers, having no law, become a law unto themselves, as will be seen by the rules of the association printed and sent to all millers, beginning with 48 pounds of flour for 60 pounds of wheat, and 13 pounds of refuse down to 23 pounds of flour for 33 pounds of wheat, with 13 pounds of offal. You will notice that as the flour decreases there is no increase of offal. In the 38 pounds of flour, 13 pounds of offal and 5 pounds for grinding. There are still 4 pounds unaccounted for, and in the 33 pounds of flour and 13 pounds of offal there are 19 pounds unaccounted for; if the 4 pounds is called justice, what do you call the 19? I presume it's all in the mill, and at any rate the farmers have been paying a very considerable portion of the money received for wheat for this mill offal.
