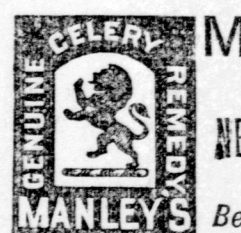

Debs et al. on Trial.
CHICAGO, Ill., Sept. 5.—The contempt
cases against Eugene V. Debs and the other
directors of the A. R. U. came up in the
United States Circuit Court today before
Judge Woods. The defendants are accused
of violating the injunction issued by Judge
Woods and Grosscup during the recent
strike. All of the defendants filed answers
in which they denied the charges preferred.
Over 100 witnesses have been subpoenaed
by the government, and the array of legal
talent on both sides is a brilliant one.

Late Canadian News.

The Story of Gen. Herbert's Fall
Denied—Suicide in a Men-
toral Barroom.

Rev. Wm. McKee, B.A., died in Battle
of typhoid fever on Sunday. Deceased was
a native of the North of Ireland.

The C. P. R. steamer Empress of India
has sailed from Hong Kong for Vancouver.
The ship has a clean bill of health.

The steamer Favorite has washed off the
sheal in Georgian Bay and was not seri-
ously damaged. All hands are safe.

James Challoner and Frank Bambaue
were drowned at White Point, Aspy Bay,
Nova Scotia, on Tuesday, while boating in
a squall.

The Ottawa Board of Trade strongly con-
demns the fire insurance underwriters who
canceled policies on lumber as a result of
the recent fires.

Damascus Commandery, Detroit Knights
Templar, gave their degree work in To-
ronto Wednesday, and were afterwards
entertained at the exhibition grounds.

Arthur Lapalliere, a young man, 29
years of age, shot himself dead last Wednes-
day night in a bar room on Chabille
Square, Montreal. He was well connected
in the city.

The Canadian Gazette is authorized to
deny the statement that Gen. Herbert has
been ordered to vacate the post of commander
of the Canadian militia and return to duty
in the Grenadier Guards.

The Toronto city treasurer has received
a check for \$7,013, being 8 per cent. of the
street railway earnings of \$87,600 for
August. Every particle of Toronto's street
car system will be electrified.

The Dominion Line steamer Toronto,
from Montreal Aug. 23, with a shipment of
318 head of cattle and 835 sheep arrived
at Bristol Wednesday and landed all her
live stock with the exception of one sheep
which died on the passage.

J. K. Young, of Chicago, projector of
the Toronto, Hamilton and Buffalo Rail-
way, has served notice of action for libel
against the Hamilton Spectator Printing
Company. The alleged libel is based on a
recent editorial in the Spectator.

Elijah Kidd has issued a writ for \$2,000
damages against Wm. Simpson for alleged
criminal conversation with the plaintiff's
wife. The parties live in Mill Grove,
township of East Flamboro, near Hamil-
ton. Kidd is a horse dealer, about 25
years old, and Simpson is a wealthy
widower.

The C. T. H. A.
ST. JOHN, N. B., Sept. 5.—It was a few
minutes after midnight when the evening
session of the C. M. B. A. Grand Council
closed. Nearly the whole night was con-
sumed in debating amendments to the con-
stitution and bylaws. All the laws pro-
posed by the Halifax branch were rejected.
A resolution was passed giving branches
power to establish and control within them-
selves sick benefit funds. The convention
closes tomorrow night.

Chicago Anarchist Fire Bugs.
CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—The grand jury has
indicted Wm. Scharl, Carl Herletz, Joseph-
phine Herletz, Gustave E. Nelson, Sophia
Nelson, Bernard Naumann and William
Wagner, anarchists fire bugs. The gang
used an ingenious bomb made in Germany
to start the blaze, which would allow the
occupants to be miles away when the fire
broke out. It is claimed that the gang de-
franded insurance companies out of \$100,
000. Wagner is said to be wanted in New
York on a charge of murder.
