Discoveries in Labrador,

The Northwest Part of the Supposed Peninsula is a Great Island.

Quebec, April 24.-The existence of one of the greatest known deposits of iron ore, and the fact that the larger portion of the supposed Labrador pen-insula is in reality an island, are among the latest discoveries of Mr. A. P. Low, of the Dominion Geological Survey. The Government has kept back the details of his latest explorations until placing them officially before Parliament this week in the summary report in the Geological Survey Department. These explorations were made in June, July, August and September, 1895, in that part of Central Labrador in which the rivers Peribonca, Ontarde, Maniconagan, and the Big River of Hudson Bay take their rise. The first portage of a mile and a half has a rise of over 600 feet. The expedition discovered that the main stream of the Maniconagan is the southerly discharge of Summit Lake, which lies almost on the 53rd degree of north latitude. Its northern discharge, which is of about the same volume, enters into the first of a number of long, narrow lakes, that are finally drained in Lake Caniapscow, and so reach the Kotsoak or Ungave River that discharges into Ungava Bay, and whole northwestern part of Labrador and the northeast territory, and forms it into an island containing upward of

150,000 square miles. In the center watershed, where the Maniconagan, the Caniapscow, the Ontarde, the Peribonca and the Big Tree River take their sources, the hills rise above the tree line, and the country is a barren waste. In the Maniconagai: River Valley, on the other hand, be-low Lake Monchalagan, many large trees of white spruce are found, which

would make excellent timber.

Lake Monchalagan is over 40 miles long, and is remarkable for its great depth of water. Some soundings of 650 feet have been taken in it, making it at least 200 feet deeper than any previously known lake in Labrador. Below this lake the Maniconagan River flows in a deep, ancient valley from a quarter of a mile to two miles wide, with steep, rocky walls rising from 500 to 1,500 feet above the water, and usually flanked with high terraces of stratified sands, gravel and clay.
