EAST BUFFALO, N. Y., Nov. 29.—Cattle unchanged. Butchers were pretty well supplied by the large runs the last two weeks, and the tone of the market was fair. Demand and full steady; choice to extra, \$7.75 to \$8; good to choice, \$7.25 to \$7.50. Sheep and lambs—There were about 12 loads of sheep and lambs on sale, including three loads of Canada lambs; the demand was active for the good kind of sheep and lambs, and considerably better for the common lambs for the home trade; lambs, choice to extra, \$3.75 to \$4.40; good to choice, \$3.15 to \$3.25; common to good, \$2.45 to \$2.75; sheep, choice to extra, \$3.75 to \$4; good to choice, \$3.50 to \$3.75; yearlings were in light supply, good demand, and quotable at \$4.25 to \$4.50; export ewes, \$3.75 to \$3.85; export weaners, \$4.25 to \$4.50; Canada lambs, \$3.25 to \$3.40. Hogs—The supply of hogs was light, 10 loads, and with a good demand the basis was higher; heavy were quotable at \$5.10 to \$5.15; mixed Yorkers and pigs, \$4.10 to \$4.15; stags, \$4 to \$4.25; the offerings were well cleaned up and the close was full steady.

MONTREAL, Nov. 29.—The receipts at the east end abattoir today were 600 head of cattle, 200 calves, 500 and 300 lambs; the demand was good and prices were unchanged. Cattle, choice, sold at 4c to 4 1/2c; good, 3 1/2c to 4c; lower grades, 2c to 3c. Calves were sold at 2c to 3 1/2c each. Sheep, 3c to 3 1/2c per lb; lambs, 3 1/2c to 4c per lb; hogs, 5 1/2c to 6c per lb.

THE ATTORNEY-GENERAL SPEAKS

A Final Decision Given in the Municipal Election Matter.

Aldermen To Be Elected by General Vote—Highest Men to Constitute Council.

The judgment of Attorney Gibson upon the meaning of the municipal act has been received by Mayor Rumball. His answer to the questions of the mayor and city solicitor was delayed by his departure from Toronto almost immediately afterwards. As soon as he returned he wrote: "I am of the view that the number of aldermen to be elected continues the same as hitherto, that the aldermen are not to be elected by wards or for wards, but by the general vote of the electors qualified to vote at municipal elections, each elector having the right to vote for the whole number in the wards in which he possesses the necessary qualifications. This might result in all the elected candidates coming from one ward or the general distribution of them, as the case may be. That, I take it, was the idea of giving the municipalities the option of taking advantage of the system. Apparently the names of the candidates for majority go on each of the ballot papers, thus affording a strong temptation to repeating, though, of course, there is only the one vote for majority."

FARCICAL CONCERT

London Times So Styles the Union of the Powers in China—Treasurer to Lose His Head.

Tien Tsin, Nov. 30.—Tung Wen Huan, provincial treasurer of Chi Li, who was sentenced to death by the international military tribunal at Pao Ting Fu, is being brought here to be publicly executed. This is the request of Hao Ting Fu military authorities.

A FARCICAL CONCERT.

London, Nov. 30.—Dr. Morrison, writing to the Times from Peking yesterday, says: "M. De Giers (Russian minister), who has previously assented to all the terms of the conjoint note, including the death penalty clause, has now announced to the Chinese envoys that Russia will insist upon the revision of the death penalty clause, substituting the provision that the guilty shall be punished by the Chinese in a manner acceptable to the powers or that the terms of the note shall not be irrevocable, but may be modified by negotiations with the Chinese envoys. Russia has thus again proclaimed her farcical and the so-called concert. The Chinese envoys are kept well informed regarding the discussions and disputes of the ministers at their meetings. So intimate, indeed, are the relations of Li Hung Chang with the Russians that there is no reason why he should not be invited to attend the conferences of the ministers. Japan repudiates that the note be amended by stipulating that China will erect a monument to the murdered Sugiyama, her chancellor of commerce."

TURKEY AND UNCLE SAM

May Soon Settle Their Little Dispute Quietly.

London, Nov. 30.—Nothing in regard to the United States battleship is coming direct from Smyrna. The authorities there are evidently censoring the dispatches.

Constantinople, Thursday, Nov. 29.—The opinion is expressed in diplomatic circles that the American claims arising from the Armenian massacre "may now be regarded as practically settled, as an irade providing for the building of a cruiser in the United States is officially promulgated."

The question of the consulate at Harpoot remains open, the porte persisting in its refusal to grant an exequatur to Dr. Thomas K. Norton.

MRS. MAYBRICK'S CASE.

New York, Nov. 30.—Renewed efforts in the interest of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, in accordance with instructions given by Secretary Hay, says a Herald dispatch from Washington. Additional evidence, showing that Mr. Maybrick was addicted to the use of the drug from which he died has been gathered and forwarded to Ambassador Choate for presentation to the Right Hon. C. T. Ritchie.

London, Nov. 30.—The officials of the United States embassy say they have not received any instructions in regard to taking further steps for the release from Woking prison of Mrs. Florence Maybrick, who is undergoing imprisonment for life after being convicted in 1889 of poisoning her husband with arsenic.

London, Nov. 30.—A Reuter dispatch from Constantinople says it is suggested that Russia is prompting the porte to refuse to grant an exequatur to Dr. Norton. The dispatch adds: "It is an open secret that they dislike the foreign consuls in Asia Minor, especially the Americans, whom they suspect of aiding the American mission work in Armenia."

THE WINNIPEG LIQUOR LAW.

Winnipeg, Nov. 30.—Mr. H. M. Powell, Q.C., has been requested by the judges of the court of Queen's bench to look into the question of the rights of the Hudson Bay Company in regard to the liquor act and the case submitted to the court by the provincial government, and to assist the court in finding out what the position and rights of the company are. At the request of the government Mr. Mulock, Q.C., will appear in support of the act.

ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE.

Toronto, Nov. 29.—Fred Wakefield, the most prominent brick manufacturer of this district, is lying at the point of death at his residence here as a result of an attempt at suicide on Monday. Wakefield was found in bed on Tuesday in an unconscious condition, with his head wrapped in the bedclothes, which were blood-stained. The doctors found that he had put the muzzle of a pistol to one of his ears, and the bullet went in at the drum, leaving scarcely any mark. He can hardly recover.

NO STRIKE ON MONDAY.

Threatened Outbreak at Toronto Averted—Montreal Lasters Go To Work—Trouble in Texas.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—A conference was held yesterday between members of the executive of the Employing Printers' Association and representatives of the Pressmen's Union, at which representatives of the executive of the Allied Printing Trades were also present. The matter of the claim of the pressmen for an increase in wages and the determination of the employers to treat the different branches of the trade as a whole were discussed at length, and an agreement was reached which will prevent the strike which was threatened to occur on Monday. The arrangements arrived at will be submitted to both bodies by their respective committees.

LASTERS BACK AT WORK. The lasters in the employ of Messrs. J. & T. Bell & Co. have returned to work, the grievances of which they complained having been satisfactorily settled by a conference. The danger of a general lock-out has thus been obviated.

TROUBLE IN TEXAS. San Antonio, Texas, Nov. 30.—One man killed and five others wounded, one fatally, is the result of a clash last night between the union and the non-union forces in the telephone strike inaugurated here on Nov. 3. The dead: Wm. Lacey, policeman; wounded: O. D. Blanton, striker, will die. Martin Wright, president of the Electrical Workers' Union, shot in the left arm; Sandy Smith, employe of telephone company, two others, names unknown. Smith did all the shooting. In company with other employes of the company he started out to repair broken wires. The men had police protection. Smith started to climb a pole. A crowd of men surrounded him, and began throwing stones, after which he ran into the Robinson stables to escape the crowd. The latter followed, and the fight was continued in the stables. Shortly afterwards came the shots. Smith and one of the strikers were placed in jail.

PRICKED HIS FINGER AND DIED. Boston, Mass., Nov. 30.—J. Thomas, a young musician and bandmaster, is dead at his home in this city from blood poisoning following the pricking of his finger with a penknife. He founded Baldwin's Cadet Band and conducted the Boston Peace Jubilee orchestra. He was born in Lowell in 1832.

TO MARK NIAGARA'S CHANNEL. Washington, Nov. 30.—Early in the last session of congress, Congressman Alexander was asked to have the west channel of the Niagara River marked with large or beacons, to be located on Canadian territory, and along the west side of Grand Island. Before action could be taken it was necessary to receive the consent of the Canadian Government. Mr. Alexander obtained this right. The work is to be done early in the spring, and the outlet the spur-buoys will be used. Should these prove insufficient, however, large or beacons will be considered.

LAPLAND FOR THE LAPLANDERS. Chicago, Nov. 30.—Four Laplanders, survivors of a party of fifteen who left their native land three years ago, with 500 reindeer, which the United States Government desired to set in route home. Through an interpreter, Jacob Lett said that the government's experiment with the reindeer had been unsuccessful for several reasons. He said: "The country did not suit either us or the reindeer. It was cold enough, but it was different in other ways. The deer did not get the same things to eat that they did in Lapland, and they did not get the same treatment. I do not know why the country proved so unhealthy for the Laplanders. Anyhow, it killed the most of our party."

THE ST. OLAF WRECK

Searchers Find the Body of One Victim—Wreckage Washed Ashore.

Quebec, Que., Nov. 30.—The schooner Marie Josephine reached here from Seven Islands, the scene of the wreck of the steamer St. Olaf, yesterday morning.

The search party worked for two days with thirty men and fifteen dogs to recover the passengers and the St. Olaf's crew, but, as already reported, without success. When the schooner left Seven Islands four men had been left on Boule Island in case any of the passengers or crew had possibly survived. The ruins of the St. Olaf were strewn all along the beach, and there is nothing but the captain's cabin, which could not be carried by an ordinary man for any distance. Among the articles found were a tan leather pocketbook, containing \$21, a new pair of gloves, some stockings, shirts, pipes, a box of preserves, two compasses, and other small articles. The coats were found, showing it was probably the crew and passengers, finding the water cold, had put on all their clothing.

The only body recovered was that of Marie Page, a girl of between 15 and 16 years of age. She had a waist on, over which was fastened a light-preserver, and the clothing on her lower extremities had been almost completely torn off by the rocks. She was lying on the beach, half in and half out of the water, and was frozen stiff.

Blood was found on the snow, from about twelve feet above the water line and the bush, but this might have been the blood of sea birds which had been beaten against the rocks by the wind, as many of them were found dead by the searchers. The snow was from two and a half to three feet deep on the beach, and in the woods, where it had fallen without drifting, it was twelve inches deep. The captain of the Marie Josephine says that from the morning of the day of the disaster the snow and wind were terrible.

Toronto, Nov. 30.—The work of saving the schooner Augusta, which is on the rocks opposite Port Credit, is becoming more difficult than was at first expected. Capt. Urie of the wrecked Augusta, and Capt. Quinn of the Jessie Drummond, and the owners of the vessels, have forwarded to the government a complaint that the foghorn on the island was not sounded last Saturday night during the snowstorm, in which both vessels missed the harbor.

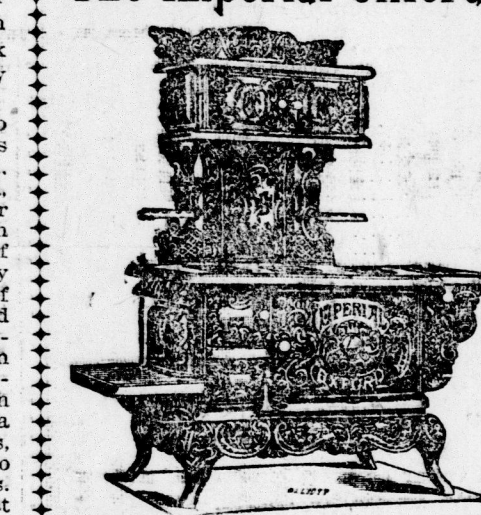
