London, March 21.—To a crowded meeting of the O. P. Club, held at the Criterion Restaurant, Miss Maud Allan, the famous Canadian dancer who originated the modern Salome dance, discoursed on the Attainable Ideal in Dancing. She has a pleasant voice-soft and low-"an excellent thing in woman," though not so excellent in a lecturer.

Whilst seeking advice how best to discharge the task she had undertaken she said, she was told to explain her own attitude towards the subject. "I not the faintest idea why I dance as I do. TRICKED SULTAN INTO PAYING UP

Ambassador Griscom's Diplomatic Ruse Is Recalled by Admiral Chester.

Rome, March 1(.- Admiral Colby Mitchell Chester, after having spent some time in Egypt, is in Rome enjoying the city and seeing his many friends, among them Ambassador Their friendship dates from the times when Mr. Griscom was charge d'affaires at Constantin-

ople in 1899. At that time the admiral was a captain and the commander of the battleship Kentucky, then on her way to the far east, and he has just recalled an incident which showed the diplomatic ability of Mr. Griscom and his readiness to seize the opportune moment.

For years he had vainly claiming the payment of certain indemnities which Turkey, with her traditional diplomacy of postponement, had evaded, and thus all efforts on peaceful lines made by several ministers of the United States had been frustrated.

Mr. Griscom thought an apparent resort to force might win the trick The Kentucky was going to Turkish waters, but could absolutely spare only five days there, which particular was unknown to the Ottoman Government. Mr. Griscom renewed his claims on the Porte, mak ing it understood that on this occasion, if the demands of the United States were not satisfied, other measures would be adopted.

Turkish Government Frightened.

Contemporaneously, he telegraphed (not in cipher) to Captain Chester to keep ready at Smyrna, but not to undertake any action until he received further instructions. This, of course, was known, as it was intended to be, to the Ottoman authorities, and Kiamil Pasha, then governor of Smyrna, implored the central government to give in, as the town was panic-stricken at the idea of being bombarded by the Kentucky.
