CLOSE TO ARREST IN CHATHAM CASE

Police Believe They Will Soon Have the Slayer of Jake Enos.

[Special to The Advertiser.]

Chatham, July 23.—The arrest of Jacob Enos' slayer is expected at any time now. The police, while not saying much, are working on a clue that they are confident will fasten the crime on the guilty party, and they are now nearer locating him than ever before.

The most plausible theory of the crime that has yet been advanced is that Enos was shot at the spot where his body was found. It is thought that Enos and Griffin were going to home on Monday night, going down King street east, and when a little beyond the C. P. R. station they were met by Frank Jackson, Jim Johnson and Guy Needham, who were going to try to make Enos return some of the money he won from them in a dice game on Monday night. Griffin was forced at the point of a revolver, to go home and leave Enos alone with them. In frightening Griffin away Jackson fired the gun, and this was the shot heard by Mrs. Beaver.

When Griffin had gone, or while Jackson and Johnson were keeping him away it is probable that a fight ensued between Enos and Needham, in which Enos slashed his opponent with a razor and succeeded in throwing him to the ground. Then Enos had slipped away and started home, and when the others found their companion had got the worst of it they started around the block to meet Enos. Two other men had come along and picked Needham up and carried him away. This would account for the story as told by Mrs. Beaver.

It is then thought that Enos' assassin had met him at the corner of Wellington and Prince streets, and had shot him dead, and that after he had fallen the guilty person or persons had turned the body over to his back.

A FLAWLESS GEM FOUND IN TRANSVAAL

Diamond Valued at \$150,000 Uncut Taken From the Premier Mine.

New York, July 23.—A report has reached Maiden Lane from Johannesburg, South Africa, of the finding of a large diamond in the Premier mine. The gem is said to weigh more than 100 carats, and is described as a pure white stone, absolutely flawless and measuring two inches long by about three-fourths of an inch thick. It is said to be the largest uncut diamond found in the world since the famous Cullinan diamond was discovered there. This gem, the largest ever found, weighed 3,022 carats in the rough. It was cut into smaller stones and presented to King Edward VII. by the Transvaal Government. The latest large diamond to be taken from the Premier mine probably will rank also among the world's famous gems.

FORTUNE IN SECURITIES MISSING FROM BANK

Mysterious Robbery Reported in Russo-Chinese Branch in N. Y.

New York, July 23.—The Russo-Chinese bank, one of the most powerful financial institutions in the far east, is short \$70,000 in negotiable bonds which disappeared from its branch office here some time last week, and there is no clue to the whereabouts of the money.

Announcement of the loss was made today by the bank and was confirmed by its counsel, but only the most meagre details are thus far available. All inquiries were referred by the bank to its counsel, who replied in turn that without the permission of the bank, he could give out only a very circumscribed statement. These are the facts as he gave them:

"The Russo-Chinese bank in this city has no vaults of its own, but rents vaults in a nearby bank, the name of which is withheld. Some time ago—precisely when is not stated—a safety deposit box containing the missing securities was taken from the neighboring vaults to the second floor of the bank."

On Thursday the loss of the securities became known. Several employees of the bank had keys to the box, but none of them had disappeared and none of them is mentioned as under suspicion, although a rigid examination of the circumstances surrounding the loss is being made."

MURDOCK'S REPLY TO MINISTER KING

He Declares Trainmen Are Always for Arbitration.

MADE A PREVIOUS OFFER

Which Was Turned Down by Grand Trunk—The Answer in Full.

Montreal, July 23.—Following is a copy of a telegram sent to Hon. MacKenzie King by Vice-President Murdock:

"Your communication of Wednesday, addressed to the undersigned, is received, and is considered of such vital importance to the community at large as to warrant my reply by telegraph."

"The organization engaged in this struggle are irrevocably committed to the principles of arbitration, but we submit that the present situation is such that unless in delays and differences of opinion in reference to the composition of any board of arbitrators should not be permitted to interfere with the almost unanimously expressed desire of the men on the Grand Trunk and Central Vermont to standardize their wage rate and conditions."

A Previous Offer.

"As you have been advised before, we offered some time ago to leave the disposition of this entire matter to the decision of Hon. E. E. Clark, of the United States interstate commerce commission, and to P. H. Morrissey, president of the Railway Employees' and Investors' Association. These two gentlemen were considered eminently qualified to pass upon identically the same question on behalf of the railroad officials and employees of some fourteen roads in the territory, and should be equally well qualified to dispose of this situation."

"Our offer was not accepted, but instead we found the officials of the Grand Trunk making a pretence of conceding 18 per cent of an increase, which we stand ready to prove means an actual increase very much less than 18 per cent."

"We are still willing to permit of a recognition of our former offer in reference to arbitration, even although the time appears to have passed when arbitration should be considered. If the officials of the Grand Trunk are disposed to accept the proposed plan of arbitration then let it be done before them for some time, as cited above, arrangements can be made for the calling off of the strike after a satisfactory agreement has been reached on the arrangement to arbitrate."

Hits at the G. T. R.

"We do not believe that any other plan of arbitration of the question in dispute could be or should be seriously considered at this time, as our experience has been that the gentlemen connected with the operation of the Grand Trunk have not heretofore been disposed to adopt and carry out decisions reached or awards filed by boards of arbitration."

"Our conviction in this respect is confirmed by the Grand Trunk's attitude in our case, where we find the president, in his letter of July 8, desiring to convey the impression to his employees and the committee that the Grand Trunk is ready to accept the award of the board, and later we find the same gentleman, on the evening that the strike went into effect, laying a proposition before the committee which is a direct and open defiance of the award of the board, and which equalizes rates and conditions on his line."

"We cannot too strongly express our sincere regret for the great inconvenience that the public have been and will be called upon to suffer during the continuance of this unfortunate strike, but the interests of the men involved and their organizations are of such vital importance that it would appear entirely contrary to the unwritten principles of self-preservation to relinquish in any particular the contentions of the men."

The First Freight.

Port Huron, Mich., July 23.—The first freight train to be moved from this city since the strike began was started on its way to Toronto this afternoon. It was composed of several flatcars and met with no opposition from the strikers.

The train was of about 35 cars. Besides the flatcars it was loaded with coal. Police officers of this city were also around to quell any possible disturbance. But no strikers were in the yards. All persons but those who had business had been excluded since the strike.

Strikebreakers Fight.

The first real disturbance in this city since the Grand Trunk strike began occurred this afternoon when the strikebreakers started a fight among themselves. It ended when George Treak, 30 years old, who was imported from Chicago, came along head-on and started a fight with the strikebreakers. The police came out and made peace. No arrests will be made because Treak did not make a complaint.

No Lockout, No Dispute.

Montreal, July 23.—Vice-President Fitzgibbon had a short, sharp comment to make in reply to the strikers' claim that the closing of the car shops at Montreal was an arbitrary result which should be investigated under the industrial disputes act.

"There was no lockout and there is no dispute," was Mr. Fitzgibbon's laconic comment.

At the same time the announcement of the company that the shops would be reopened on Monday has caused no little speculation. One conjecture is heard to the effect that perhaps the labor department made pertinent inquiries with regard to the move.
