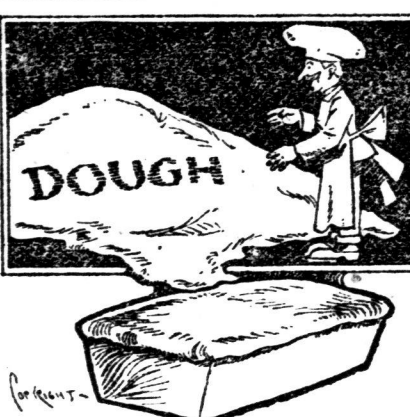

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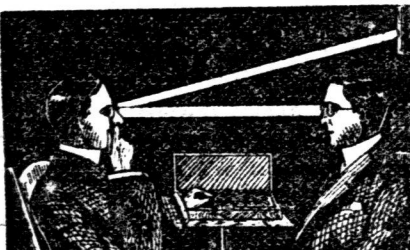

HAMILTON POLICE AFTER AUTOMOBILISTS

Must Carry Number on the Rear of the Body of the Car.

Automobilists in Hamilton have been neglecting the letter of the law in regard to the rear numbers on their automobiles. The law provides that the rear numbers shall be on the body of the car, and on a line with the rear lamp, so that at night the light shall shine on the number. Up to the present this requirement has often been overlooked, but auto owners who persist in continuing to break the law are now being summoned to answer for their neglect to comply. This regulation has always been enforced in London, and motorists almost uniformly comply with it. Only occasionally do the local police discover delinquents who overlook this matter.

Annual Banquet Takes Place in Toronto Tonight.

Toronto, Oct. 18.—At a meeting of the executive of the Huron Old Boys' Association, held in the Prince George last night, final arrangements were completed for the annual dinner, which takes place tonight. Adam Beck was to take up the cudgels against Mr. King, but the former has stated that he will stick to Provincial politics and see his Niagara power scheme through to a finish.

Y. M. C. A. BOYS ARE ASKING CITIZENS' HELP

Each Citizen Is Expected to Pay 50 Cents Towards a Good Work.

The Y. M. C. A. boys' department have caught the enthusiasm of the Toronto Y. M. C. A. campaign. They have divided the city into districts, and put a certain number of boys in each. They are going to canvass every house, asking only 50 cents, to put their rooms in such a condition that the citizens of London will bring all of their visitors to see the London Y. M. C. A. boys' department. They will bring all strangers to see the place where the boys of London get their all-round development. They will show people where the London boys go to spend their evenings, instead of on the street.

The citizens should encourage the boys in their efforts to help the conditions in the boy kingdom of London. said an officer of the Y. M. C. A. The boys are the future citizens. They are responsible for the men of tomorrow, and the Y boys ask them to help them, as they plan to raise the moral, social and educational life of the boys of London. Fifty cents is not much, but if every citizen who is able gives 50 cents, the city of London will not hang its head for shame, at the conditions that prevail in the boys' department of the Y. M. C. A.

The Reasons.

1. The boys take in a thing he has been given.

2. The boys want more games, etc., to amuse themselves with. There is not enough to go around at present.

3. The boys are tired of the street for amusement.

4. The boys know the street corner is where they get into trouble, and do the things they are ashamed of.

5. (a) The boys want to make a home for the boys who have not a home. (b) Many boys in London have no papers, books or magazines to read in their homes. (c) Many boys have no games to play at home. (d) Many boys have no chance to hear a piano and sing some of the popular songs, unless they come to the Y. M. C. A. (e) Many boys do not go to Sunday school, but they gladly join the group Bible class at the Y. M. C. A. (f) Many boys do not go out on tramps to the country like the "Y" boys. (g) Many boys are not in the school. (h) Many boys never get to the big camps like Fisher's Glen.

6. The London Y. M. C. A. boys want to know why they cannot have a piano of their own like Stuart's. Why they cannot have enough good games to amuse 75 boys in the rooms all the time as well as ten or twelve. Why they cannot have a room or rooms at Ottawa or Brantford, or Stratford. Why they cannot have as good running clubs, poultry clubs, snowshoe clubs, etc.

"Now they are coming to the people to tell them they will beat any city yet mentioned if they will stand by them, the officers continued. They will improve the Y. M. C. A. boys' department. They will increase the number of boys in Bible study. They will lessen the number of boys on the street corners."

"They will raise the moral life of the boys. They will raise the mental standard and encourage them to improve for the churches."

"They will give the boys clean sports. They will train Bible class teachers for the churches."

"The boys are bringing in good reports so far."

One boy reported six out of ten tickets sold within twelve hours of the time he received them.

BISHOP WILLIAMS AT PORT HOPE SERVICE

Attended Speech Day Proceedings of Trinity College.

Port Hope, Oct. 18.—The speech day proceedings of Trinity College School were held today, and passed off very successfully, many visitors coming from Toronto and other outside points.

Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Huron preached the sermon at the religious service in the school chapel. At the close of this service Bishop Reeve donated a stained glass window in memory of Humphrey Ernan, an old boy of the school, the new west doors and stalls in memory of Frederick Ridout, another old boy, who died in India, and the new festival altar.

WESTERN JOURNAL OUT OF BUSINESS

Liquidator Appointed for Calgary News, as Delict Reaches Nearly \$70,000.

Calgary, Alta., Oct. 18.—Mr. Justice Stuart today appointed the Trusts and Guarantee Company liquidator for the Daily News Publishing Company. The appointment was reached after a compromise. The assets, according to a statement made up to Aug. 1, show liabilities over assets of \$56,000. These have increased by \$10,000 since that time. In the statement the assets are put in at inventory value, which is somewhat large. When all is liquidated it is expected that little will be left for the unpreferred creditors.

In court the solicitor for the News read out the list of shareholders of the News. In addition to Dan McGillivuddy there were Hon. Frank Oliver and Hon. Messrs. Rutherford, Cross, Cushing and Findlay.

Among the creditors of the company are the Goss Printing Company, the Toronto Type Foundry, which are secured and Tees and Perse, E. S. Riley, Lieut.-Governor Bullock, A. J. McArthur, M. P. P. Sheriff Vanwart, and many others of smaller amounts.

GETS TWENTY YEARS. HESPELER ACCIDENTS.

Parry Sound, Oct. 18.—Joseph Lavigne, alias Joseph Albert Roy, twice previously convicted, imprisoned and lashed, for offences against little girls, was again today convicted of carnally knowing a little girl of thirteen years, named Edna Wright. The jury took a merciful view of the case, and brought in a verdict for the lesser offence, but Mr. Justice Clute, who evidently recognized that the accused was a moral degenerate, inflicted a sentence of twenty years in the penitentiary and twenty lashes.

Hesper, Oct. 18.—Three painful accidents occurred here today. While at work in Krib's planing mill, Thomas Walsley had four fingers of his left hand cut off. Rev. Mr. Bridgman, while assisting some men to pull a pump, had his hand badly smashed. The third accident was the most serious one. Oswald Monday, a workman
