Edmonton, Oct. 10.—While changing his footing on the top tier of the immense steel bridge of the C. N. R. over the Pembina river at Entwistle, Joseph Johnstone, structural ironworker, accidentally touched one of the rivets, striking him on the forehead, and he was sent hurtling through the air a terrible drop of 150 feet to the river below. The falling man struck an out-jutting beam on the lower deck of the bridge, and the body's drop was deflected from open water onto a raft, upon which he fell, alighting on his head and being instantly killed.

MR. NEELY REPLIES

TO TEMPERANCE PEOPLE

Issues Statement in Which He Refuses to Commit Himself in Any Way.

Mr. George W. Neely, ex-M. P. P., the Conservative candidate in the coming by-election in East Middlesex, has forwarded his reply to the questions asked him by the temperance party on Saturday last. The letter is sent to Prof. James H. Bowman, and in it Mr. Neely refuses to subscribe to the propositions submitted by the advocates of temperance. Mr. Neely advocates a temperance man, however. His reply is as follows:

"Dear Sir—In reply to the propositions re temperance submitted by you and Rev. Mr. Spence to me the other day, I may say that on account of being very ill, as I was when you were conversing with me, and, as still, that I delayed my answer until now.

"While not wishing, specifically, to subscribe my signature to the propositions and questions asked by you, there is nothing in your questions that I am not thoroughly in accord with, where the ways and means of bringing about the object of your desires are sane and rational. This knowledge being absent at the present time, we hesitate to submit ourselves merely to a general statement.

"Being a supporter of the Government now in power, and who must be responsible for all legislation transacted, propositions of an irrational nature may only be prompted by those in opposition, who, if they were in power, might modify them a great deal. Also, the principle is wrong for the man who may be called upon to use his judgment in enacting legislation to forepromise himself before knowing all the details in connection with the question brought out.

"This is not given as a reason for not pledging myself to the definite statements which you submitted. I do not wish to parade or have my virtues paraded before the public, but I may say, however, that I am heartily in accord, as my past will bear me out, with anything that tends to promote temperance. Sarnia, Oct. 10.—Two men employed as deckhands on the package freighter Lakeport were rescued from drowning in St. Clair River last night by the heroism of Charles O'Connor, a shipmate of theirs. One of the men, named McKinnon, lost his balance, and fell into the water. O'Connor promptly sprang in after him and had no sooner succeeded in getting him safely aboard again, when another member of the crew, whose name is not known, fell in, and was nearly drowned before O'Connor reached him, and after a hard struggle managed to keep him up until help arrived.

The Sarnia City, one of the tugs belonging to the Erie Dredging Company, was bound down today by the Imperial Oil Company's barges.

Three boxes of real, ripe strawberries were brought here today by Mr. C. L. Yates. The berries were grown on the farm of James Yates in the vicinity of Blackwell, and are all second-crop growth. Only a week or two ago samples of raspberries were shown here which were grown on the Indian reservation, also second-crop production.
