Londoner Returns From Eng-
land With German Trophy
as Souvenir.

LLOYD GEORGE IDOLIZED

Biggest Man in England At
Present Time, Says
John Lang.

With a German trophy captured by a British soldier in the retreat from Mons in the form of a metal decoration for an artilleryman's helmet, John Lang, 155, Teemess avenue, returned from a four-months' visit to England yesterday.

Mr. Lang's vessel had to run the gauntlet in coming from an English port, but neither sighted nor was sighted by any submarines, save those of the British fleet.

The condition that impressed itself most forcibly upon Mr. Lang was the splendid manner in which the British Government was taking care of the wives and other relatives of soldiers.

Many women were securing thirty shillings weekly who had never had more than ten or twelve before, and they were prosperous as never before.

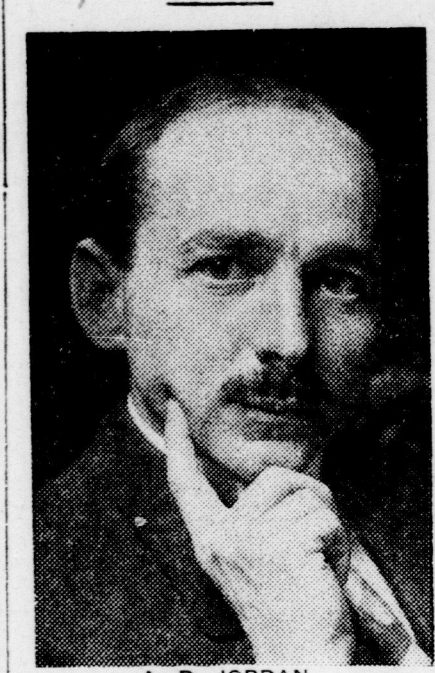
THE DIARY OF MARS

The deadlock in the negotiations between Austria and Italy has been broken, and hopes of a settlement of the questions at issue without resort to arms have been revived in Rome. It is not known by persons other than those closely concerned what chance has taken place to relieve the apparently hopeless situation, but Rome assumes that either Austria or Italy has made some concession. Italy has been represented previously as demanding in the entirety the Trent and Istria districts, as well as the Dalmatian islands in the Aegean where Austria was believed to be willing to yield only a comparatively small part of this territory.

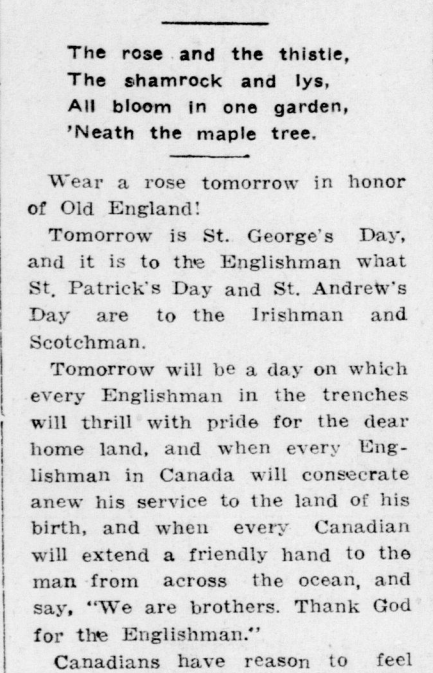

The organ at the exhibition is located in Festival Hall. It has 114 speaking stops, and in addition has taken the fighting near Ypres, as when the British Festival Hall will be a place of greater interest to the fortunate candidates in The Advertiser contest.

Mr. Jordan's musical career at the age of twelve as organist of St. Clement's Anglican Church, Toronto. His church in the Methodist Church in this city was pronounced by no less an authority than Sir Frederick Bridge as the finest church choir in Canada.

His being chosen for the great exhibition at San Francisco is regarded as a distinct honor to himself, to his church and to the city.

On his return Mr. Jordan will conduct examinations for the Toronto College of Music, at Victoria, Vancouver, Calgary, Edmonton, Moose Jaw, Regina, Brandon and Winnipeg.</
