#### DUTTON MAN CUT IN TWO BY GEARS OF A TRACTION ENGINE NEAR HOME TOWN

(Special to The Advertiser.)  
DUTTON, Nov. 20.—John Lodge of Dutton met a terrible death tonight when his body was almost cut in two by cogwheels or gears on the top of a threshing engine, about two miles from Dutton on the farm of Neil McKellar.

Mr. Lodge had just drawn his out-let into Mr. McKellar's place, and was setting it up ready for an early start in the morning. He was going to uncouple the separator from the tractor while the engine was running, when it occurred to him that the breaks of his engine needed some adjusting. He mounted one of the wheels, and when leaning over his coat became caught in the cogwheels and he was drawn through a set of gears, being almost

cut in two at the centre of his body. He lived for about 45 minutes, during which time Dr. Cameron of Dutton and Dr. McFarlane of Wallacestown, who were summoned, administered what relief they could.

Mr. Lodge was about 35 years of age, and the best-known thresher in the townships of Dunwich, Alldreda and Southwell, having operated the machinery of his father for upwards of twenty years.

He had threshed in Dunwich during the afternoon, and the news of the tragedy, which spread like wildfire, caused consternation and general mourning in that community. He is survived by his wife, four sons, the eldest about 7 years old, his father and mother, one brother and two sisters.

#### PRO-ALLY STUDENTS PRECIPITATE TROUBLE

LONDON, Nov. 20.—4:25 p.m.—The Greek Government has ordered that the University of Athens be closed, owing to disturbances on the part of the students. Reuter's Athens correspondent cabled.

ATHENS, Greece, Nov. 20.—A number of students of Athens University comprised the principal portion of the crowd in pro-Entente demonstrations held yesterday. They were headed by Professor Petmezis of the law faculty of the university. An endeavor was made to secure a mass meeting of the students for the purpose of passing resolutions to King Constantine in favor of abandoning neutrality and espousing the cause of the Allies.

#### GERMANS CLAIM TO BE CLOSING UPON CITY OF CRAIOVA

Announces Its Forces Are Near Wallachian Capital.

#### FIGHTING IS INTENSIFIED

Struma Front and Danube Scene of Heavy Engagements, Says Berlin.

BERLIN, via Sayville, Nov. 20.—The German war office announced tonight that the Teutonic troops in Rumania are approaching Craiova, the capital of Western Wallachia, 120 miles west of Bucharest.

North of the Somme an artillery duel is in progress, it is announced. Lively fighting is reported on the Lower Danube and on the Struma front.

The Rumanian city of Craiova is on the railroad midway between Orsova, on the extreme western border of Rumania, and Bucharest, the Rumanian capital. The German war office announced today that the Teutonic troops pushing behind the Rumanians in southwestern Rumania had reached the Orsova-Craiova railroad.

#### AFRAID OF GERMANY'S WELL-KNOWN METHODS

International Spy Seeks American Citizenship As Protection.

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—Armand K. Graves, the so-called "international spy," who is held in \$2,000 bail on a charge of attempting to blackmail Countess von Bernstorff, wife of the German ambassador, took out his first citizenship papers here today.

His attorney explained that Graves feared the German Government to get possession of his person, and said that as a citizen he could demand protection of this Government.

#### SWISS REFUSE TO RECOGNIZE POLAND

Paris, Nov. 21.—The Swiss Government has decided not to recognize the newly-created Kingdom of Poland, according to a Swiss dispatch to the Radio Agency. The dispatch adds that the decision will not, however, be made public until after the war.

#### APPROVES AMERICAN ENTERPRISE IN CHINA

London, Nov. 21.—"On the broadest ground the resumption by America of a share in the commercial development of China is altogether welcome," says the Daily News in an editorial this morning. "The world will remain poorer so long as the vast resources of China lie undeveloped. It is only by American or European capital that they can be developed, and there is no lending power in the world whose motives in entering the China field are less open to suspicion than America's. Her presence there will be strength to China."

#### Leamington Officer, Winner of Military Cross



CAPT. W. G. GIDLEY, well-known popular Leamingtonian, former member of the 99th, or "Price of Essex Battalion," now serving with the 19th Battalion, C.E.F., on the Somme front, where he has recently been awarded the Military Cross for deeds performed upon the world's greatest battlefield that have secured the King's recognition and brought to Leamington's first soldier this coveted honor, so dear to the heart of every one who wears the khaki.

Capt. Gidley entered the London school for an officer's training course just one year ago today, and when the 99th Battalion was formed he took over the command of "Wellington Barracks" in Leamington, upon Capt. Don C. Morton being transferred to Windsor, and it was largely through his untiring energy that the Leamington company reached such a stage of perfection as to be commended in high terms by Col. Shannon, D.O.C., and Lieut.-Col. H. D. Smith, G.S.O., at an inspection early last winter.

Capt. Gidley is every inch a soldier and his friends are confident that if spared still greater honors are in store for one of those who took the honor of Leamington to the battlefields in Flanders and has so stoutly maintained it.

#### Japan True To Allies

NEW YORK, Nov. 20.—That Japan will remain faithful to the cause of the Allies, no matter what the outcome of the war, was the assurance of the Allies, to King George from the mikado by the Marquis Mayeda, who arrived in New York today on the steamship New York of the American Line, en route to England. The marquis is one of the wealthiest men in Japan and holds the rank of captain in the Imperial Guard.

The marquis would not discuss his mission beyond saying he bore a personal message from the mikado to the King, but a member of his party said the message was one of assurance of Japan's faithfulness and to put at rest certain stories circulated through German propaganda to the effect that Japan and Russia would soon enter into a treaty with Germany.

#### PIRATES REPLY TO LATEST NOTES OF PRESIDENT WILSON

Claim They Did Not Fire on Rowanmore's Lifeboats.

Berlin, Nov. 20.—Via London, Nov. 21.—Secretary Grew of the United States embassy, received today the German reply in regard to the sinking of the British steamer Rowanmore and three steamers which were lost in September. In regard to the Rowanmore the German Government denies that the submarine fired on lifeboats containing members of the crew, and maintains that the men on the Rowanmore owe their lives to the precautions taken by the Germans and the skill with which their operations were carried out.

In respect to two of the remaining steamers in question the German Government states they were not sunk by German forces, and maintains that the Antwerp, the third steamer, was destroyed in full accordance with the rules of international law.

The Antwerp was built at Newport News, for the Standard Oil Company, and was on her maiden trip to London when she was sunk. She was a vessel of 11,300 tons.

#### AS USUAL.

New York, Nov. 21.—The British steamship Siamese Prince, returning in ballast after delivering a cargo of horses at Brest for the French Government, was fired upon without warning, presumably by a German submarine, off the French coast on November 4, according to officers of the vessel, which arrived here today.

Three shots were fired, the officers said, two in quick succession, which passed over the port quarter, and a third soon after, which dropped into the water astern. The lifeboats were swung out, the crew of 42 and the 54 hostlers donned preservers, and the ship put on full speed. The craft which attacked was not sighted at any time, owing partly to weather conditions, and the officers of the Siamese Prince were unable to say whether their vessel was pursued. The hostlers included "great many Americans," it was stated. No attempt was made to torpedo the ship, which was owned by Furness, Withy & Co., and which carried no passengers. The officers of the vessel judged that the attacking boat was about one mile distant.

#### NORTHCLIFFE'S NEPHEW "KILLED IN ACTION"

Second Son of Lord Rothermere Dies for His King.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—Lord Rothermere's second son, the Hon. Vere Sidney Tudor Rothermere, has been killed in battle.

Lieut. Rothermere was a nephew of Lord Northcliffe, owner of the Times, Daily Mail and other papers. He was born in 1895. He was formerly a midshipman in the royal navy, and later a lieutenant of the Royal Naval Volunteer Reserve. He served in the war with the 4th Battalion, Naval Division.

#### ENGLISH PAPERS UP IN COST.

LONDON, Nov. 20.—5:32 p.m.—A resolution was passed today at a meeting of the representatives of British newspaper proprietors, held in London, recommending that the newspapers throughout the country raise their price by a halfpenny.

A London dispatch on November 13 reported an increase in the price of the London Times, beginning November 20, to three halfpence, or a halfpenny above the former price.

#### Sir Wilfrid Is Swamped by His Friends' Regards

Messages of Congratulation on 75th Birthday Pour in From Whole World.

#### ALLOWED TO RETURN, BUT AFTER WAR ONLY

American Expelled From France Given More Consideration.

PARIS, Nov. 20.—The order of the minister of the interior, by which Gustav Adolph Trube, general manager of the French Westinghouse Airbrake Company, was deported from France last January, has been modified so as to allow him to return after the war, if he desires.

Although a native American, born in New York, Mr. Trube was given 48 hours in which to leave the country. As in deportation cases the ministry does not usually give the reasons for its action, the U. S. Government officials are unaware of the real cause of his expulsion.

#### INDUSTRIALS "BEAT" WAY TO THEIR CONVENTION

Chicago, Nov. 21.—Small wooden shoes, the emblem of Sabotage, are being worn today as badges by delegates to the tenth annual convention of the Industrial Workers of the World, in session here. Many of the 150 delegates asserted they had "beaten" their way to Chicago to save expense.

#### GERMAN HOME ARMY HAS REVOLT GERM, STATES TAGEBLATT

Compulsory Service of the Civilians Arouses Hostility.

Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 21.—The Berlin Tageblatt, discussing the compulsory service of civilians in the proposed "home army," expresses the belief that the step will cause "a deep but quiet revolution in Germany." The Tageblatt declares that "Germany must emerge from the war a free parliamentary country, and everybody who is passionately engaged in seeing the end of international hatred should be faithful."

Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg has left Berlin for a short visit to army headquarters, according to the Cologne Volks Zeitung.

#### HINDENBURG URGES COERCION FOR FARMERS

Amsterdam, via London, Nov. 21.—The German papers print a second letter addressed by Field Marshal von Hindenburg to Chancellor von Bethmann-Hollweg, emphasizing his belief that a certain amount of coercion is necessary for the solution of the foodstuffs problem, and working power problems. As a result of the field marshal's first letter dealing with these questions the German economic council has issued an appeal to the farmers to use their utmost efforts in the production of foodstuffs.

#### MERCIER NOT GOING TO PAPAL CONSISTORY

Rome, via Paris, Nov. 21.—Cardinal Mercier, primate of Belgium, will not be present at the consistory on December 4 for the investiture of cardinals, as he does not desire to ask the permission of the German authorities to make the journey or to risk the chance of another demonstration such as occurred on the occasion of his visit to Rome last January. No foreign cardinals will attend the consistory except Cardinal Amette, Archbishop of Paris.
