whip up the Progressives.

HALCROW RAPS DRURY'S POLICY ON HYDRO ISSUE

**Declares Bancroft Minority
Report of Approval Merit-
ed Consideration.**

LAUDS ABILITY OF BECK

**Hall Believes Government Is
Acting Wisely in Chip-
pawa Stand.**

TORONTO, Feb. 22.—Both speeches
delivered in the Ontario Legislature
this afternoon in continuation of the
debate on the reply to the speech
from the throne turned out to be
more or less criticism of the govern-
ment.

G. G. Halcrow of Hamilton East,
Labor member, formerly a supporter
of the Drury ministry, attacked the
government on its hydro record,
blamed it for what he termed the
starvation wages paid on government
highway construction, and said it had
shown no enterprise in dealing with
unemployment.

The other speaker, R. R. Hall, Lib-
eral of Parry Sound, agreed with
the government on its hydro policy,
but attacked it on what he claimed
was the cabinet's failure to deal with
the unemployment situation ade-
quately, criticized them for not doing
more for the north country, and
wanted to have settlers given per-
mission to cut timber on the free
farms they receive in the newer parts
of the province and enable them to
earn a living until they raise crops.

Sergeant-Major McNamara of
Riversdale will be the first speaker
tomorrow.

G. G. Halcrow commented on his
position on the opposition side of the
house. While he had been moved
from the government benches to
those of the opposition during the
recess without his consent, he did not
regret that he now had an opportu-
nity to face the ministers instead of
talking behind their backs.

He did criticize, however, the ac-
tions of laborers who held a meet-
ing at which his position was dis-
cussed and he was not invited to be
present.

Halcrow Backs Recall.
Taking up his criticism of the gov-
ernment, Mr. Halcrow said he was a
supporter of the recall, so much so
that he had written his resignation
before he entered the house so that
his constituents could recall him if
they desired, and he wanted to know
if the U. F. O. members still adhered
to this plank.

Halcrow attacked the actions of
the government in connection with
unemployment. He claimed the at-
titude of the Farmer-Labor cabinet
in receiving a deputation on unem-
ployment was less sympathetic than
was former Premier Arthur Meighen
when he received a similar deputa-
tion, and while the speaker had hated
and detested the party to which Mr.
Meighen belonged, he claimed the
record of the Meighen administration
in coping with the unemployment
situation was better than that
of the Drury administration.

He advocated shortening the hours
of labor, and accused the Drury gov-
ernment of being responsible for a
30-cent-an-hour wage on the govern-
ment highway, "a starvation
wage," he asserted.

Mr. Halcrow stood for public
ownership as to the timber resources
of the province.

"If men like Backus can make
money out of pulp mills, why can-
not the province go into the pulp
business and make money as a pub-
lic enterprise?" he inquired.

He also thought the government
was "passing the buck" as to hydro
radicals and the Chippawa project,
and came out in strong indorsement
of Sir Adam Beck and the hydro
commission.

Fears Great Loss.
It would be most unfair and a
great loss to the province to prevent
Sir Adam, "the greatest authority
in the province in hydro matters,"
addressing meetings and giving an
account of his stewardship.

The greatest danger that could
come would be to make a political
football of hydro.

He dealt with the report of the
commission on hydro radicals, insist-
ing that the greatest consideration
should have been given to the mi-
nority report submitted by Fred Ban-
croft, indorsing the schemes.

He defended the hydro commission's
engineers as having been right on
important details of the Chippawa
construction when their decisions had
been questioned.

While he did not wish to go back
to old conditions in connection with
the liquor question, Mr. Halcrow de-
clared the Ontario temperance act
was making "liars, hypocrites,
thieves and even murderers."

Precedent Set in Elgin Courts When Both Juries Are Found Unnecessary

Special to London Advertiser.
ST. THOMAS, Feb. 22.—Not only
will there be no criminal cases for
the supreme court, which opens in
this city Monday next before Mr.
Justice Latchford, but there will be
need for neither grand nor petit jury,
which taken altogether makes an
unusual situation in the history of
the courts in Elgin County. It was
stated on Wednesday that this ses-
sion will be the first time in the his-
tory of the county that no jury cases
were contained in the docket of such a
court.

Perhaps the most important of the
four civil cases to come before Mr.
Latchford involves the sale of a por-
tion of land in Southwell Township,
with Crown Attorney Angus McCrim-
mon as defendant, and William Rol-
lin Jackson of this city as plaintiff.
The land was sold to William J.
Schairo of Port Stanley in March
1917.

The plaintiff is asking for a decree
many of them would be willing to
