

CITY MINISTERS DENY FRASER'S CHARGES

SPRINGER HEIRS RESENT ARTICLE PRINTED TODAY

Declare Editorial in Toronto
Paper Intended To Dis-
courage Search.

ALL ARE OPTIMISTIC

An editorial in a Toronto paper this morning stated that the fabulous Springer estate had been proved a myth, and that the hundreds of heirs who had filed claims as participants in the estate would be forced to look upon their efforts and expenditures as wasted. The article stated that Christopher Springer was not a man of great wealth, but that in handling property for the old Swedes Church in Philadelphia, he had in some way become connected with the land and that it had been leased and not sold to the church, of which he was a member.

The heirs to the estate, if such an estate exists, do not share the pessimistic opinion of the Toronto paper and are emphatic in their belief that the estate, not only exists, but that it is within a short distance of being proved.

J. Scott, of Delaware, one of the Ontario delegates of the Springer Heirs' Association, who has just returned from the association's annual meeting in Chicago on Sept. 11, has this to say: "The report which you mention is utterly false, and is intended to discourage further search and inquiry towards the proving of the estate. I am not permitted to divulge anything at present, as to how far the search has brought results, but we are still confident of clearing up the estate and recovering the whole of it."

Says Fabrication.

"During the recent meeting in Chicago, a reporter from the Chicago Journal entered the board room and presented a clipping from the Chicago Tribune, stating that the estate was a myth and so forth. He asked for a direct statement for publication, and he was told that none would be forthcoming, and further that any unauthorized publication intended to hinder or damage the search of the Springer estate would be followed by a prosecution for libel. I have nothing to add, other than that the statement in the paper you mention is an absolute fabrication," he stated.

Miss Florence Springer, of Beattie York street, says: "I have not been following the matter very closely at present, but from what my father writes me from Burgessville I would gather that there can't be much truth in the report you have just read. At least they are continuing the necessary procedure to recover the estate."

Louis Springer, of Chatham, another member of the Springer Heirs' Association, is at present out of town, but his daughter, Mabel Springer, commenting on the statement of the Toronto paper said: "I don't believe a word of it, and I know that it will cause trouble. There was considerable unpleasantness during the recent meeting in Chicago when one paper tried the same thing, and with practically the same story. They had

to withdraw the statement to avoid a libel suit. It was decided there and then that any further misrepresentation of the case would be followed by legal action."

Resent Statements.

"The matter, after all, is one for the Springer family, and this continual knocking is resented. The estate is there, and that is what the heirs are continuing the search in an effort to prove their claims. This is all I can say concerning the matter," she concluded.

Mrs. D. Welch of Sycamore street, one of the direct heirs to the estate, when questioned concerning the reported ending of the Springer hopes, said: "Yes, I read the article, and I believe it is absolute lies. I don't know what the Springer lawyers have found recently, but I believe that the estate can be proved and recovered. One thing that convinces me that the estate is still intact is the report of Dr. Sinclair of Belmont, who visited Wilmington to ascertain what was known of the estate there. He said on his return that not only was the estate recognized there, but that people who are holding some of the Springer property there have refused to improve the property because they knew that eventually the Springer heirs could and would recover the property."

Claims Mistaken Belief.

The editorial in the Toronto paper, which has created such a storm of protest among the Springer heirs, is a mistake, and the Springer heirs are not at all discouraged by it. which was really betting, would a man be found who really considered betting immoral. The province had dealt with betting as a local and private matter in the same way it had dealt with the liquor question. Excessive drinking might be considered immoral and in that sense of crime.

Mr. Bayly pointed out that in the constitutional question submitted to the court, the judge, Denison, held that the province could not create a Dominion act. Here the province was not attempting to vitiate a Dominion act. He said that the act might be justified on the ground that

it dealt with civil rights, but he preferred to put it on the ground that it dealt with a matter of a local and private nature.

Chief Justice Meredith: "If the province passed this act in this respect, it might pass similarly in respect of murder."

Mr. Justice Riddell: "Murder must be included in 'criminal law' and therefore excluded from provincial jurisdiction."

Mr. Bayly continued that the province had treated betting as an economic evil which was not to be assisted.

Chief Justice Meredith: "In other words, the province purports to amend the Dominion law."

Mr. Justice Riddell asked whether Mr. McCarthy's argument was in fact for bills of lading prescribed under Dominion authority. Mr. Bayly responded that the province had enacted insurance legislation supplementary to Dominion legislation. Mr. Justice Riddell pointed out that the province could legislate with regard to the railways along railways, though the railways were under Dominion authority.

Chief Justice Meredith: "Both legislatures look after the railways; only one looks after crime."

Chief Justice Meredith's argument was brief, and he had only shown that the field was occupied by Dominion legislation when the court stopped him and said that it was unnecessary for him to go further.

Mr. Justice Riddell: "In my mind the Dominion made furnishing of racing information part of the criminal law, and in the face of that the province cannot legislate."

Mr. Bayly: "There must be a conflict. There is no conflict here. The province has occupied a remote corner of the field."

Chief Justice Meredith: "The appeal must be dismissed because parliament has dealt with this very subject and has occupied the field. The legislature, therefore, has no jurisdiction. The appeal is dismissed, and on that ground alone."

Crown Attorney J. C. Elliott, when informed of the decision of the appellate division of the Supreme Court of Ontario, that the betting information act was ultra vires did not seem surprised.

Act Now Inoperative.

Mr. Elliott, who was lunching at the London Club, interrupted his meal long enough to explain that this decision of the court the law remained as it was before the act was passed. At first he thought that only sections of the act might be affected, but on reading the despatch he decided that it referred to the whole act, which although it remains on the statutes of the province, is inoperative.

Magistrate A. H. M. Graydon stated that he had believed that the act would uphold Judge Denison's decision. Beyond this he had no opinion to express.

"This decision of the supreme court is an upheaval," he stated. PHONE ACCOUNTS FOR ALL DENY NOT KEPT IN LONDON

Hub of Bell Telephone Com-
pany's Activities in West-
ern Ontario.

KEEPS 40 MEN BUSY

The importance of London as the center of Western Ontario is becoming daily more obvious and another sign of the times is displayed in the fact that the local offices of the Bell Telephone Company contain the accounting staff which does all the arithmetical work for number seven district, which is really this part of the western peninsula.

The district in which the local office operates extends from Kincardine in the north to Thamesford in the east, is bounded on the south by Lake Erie and stretches as far west as Windsor and Sarnia. This vital and interesting work is carried out in London by a staff of some 40 men and women, and the director, Mr. A. W. Jones, the revenue supervisor of the district. In this most modern and efficient organization, which is a branch of the Bell Telephone Company, each operator is able to take care of 7,500 accounts, over 200,000 calls from the subscribers, and a large number of long distance calls.

A Wonderful Machine.

Then there is a machine, with all the ability of a Burroughs adding machine, plus the graceful wave of the hand, which in a few seconds gives the operator the telephone rate between any two telephone stations on the American continent. The Bell Telephone Company is better known to most Londoners by the men in blue jeans who are armed with all the latest scientific instruments for locating and fitting to cope with the most ferocious pole or wire in the world. The work that is done by the accounting staff is a very important part of the telephone service, and the accounting centers are located in Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, Hamilton and London, each center being responsible for a certain number of accounts within its territory.

Accounts have to be prepared for local and long distance service, and the necessary entries must be made to the subscriber's ledger records from the telephone company's commercial department. Adjustments constantly occur in accordance with changes in the type of service rendered to the different subscribers.

An Intricate Job.

The intricacy of the accounting that is carried out by the department is obvious when it is remembered that a toll call may be routed over the lines of several companies, and the appropriate accounting measures must be maintained for the proper distribution of this revenue to the various companies.

The voucher and pay roll sections of the work are as intricate and as well organized as the rest of the business of the staff. Items to be charged for payment are routed through the lines of organization to the voucher or supervisor, and all payments of a miscellaneous nature not paid for through the working advance accounts are examined to see that they are in order for payment.

Making Up Pay Roll.

When it comes to the question of the pay roll, resort is made again to the infallible card index. Pay rolls are for the most part prepared twice a month, and with the very constant changes are the source of considerable work and detail. On the top of all this the branch of the local office of which Mr. Jones is in charge draw up charts and graphs representing the results of operations, revenue and expenses, station development, and other data of a similar nature that is needed in the system and requires expert knowledge and the greatest accuracy. This is the accounting department in the present building on Clarence street is one that will probably take up a new abode in the building by the C. N. CITY CLERGYMEN DENY THAT UNION IS LOSING GROUND

Presbyterian Ministers of London
Brand Principal Fraser
Statement as Unjustified.

VOTE IS ANSWER

Declarations in Toronto yesterday to the effect that church union had aroused no enthusiasm and that the Presbyterian minority "had never been so violently dealt with" were branded as "unrepresentative" and "unjustified" by a prominent London Presbyterian clergyman today.

Principal Fraser's statement that union was losing ground was vigorously denied locally. But the assertion which called forth most comment was that in which it was said "there has been no precedent in religious history where the minority had been so scandalously dealt with."

"The answer to these charges," Rev. William Beattie said, "is the vote of the general assembly when union was approved by the tremendous majority of 427 to 23. As to the statement of Mr. Fraser that the minority had been violently dealt with, I may say never in the history of proposed unions has a minority been given such strong assurances of rights. The minority churches have been given all the property they could adequately use and a generous share of endowments. Any individual church is permitted to withdraw at any time, and six months after it is consummated and can take with them their entire property. These congregations who vote themselves out will be given a full share in the endowments and general funds in proportion to their strength. I think the anti-unionist statements are unjustified. I do not believe that union is regarded in the half-hearted light referred to by Mr. Fraser."

Rev. W. R. McIntosh of the King Street Presbyterian Church, labelled the utterances of anti-union representatives as "unrepresentative."

"They are resorting to the tactics of calling names which I don't think is very creditable," Mr. McIntosh said. "Dr. Gandler, who issued an official statement which showed everything had been done in a constitutional way, was expected that the fight being long over, the minority would show their good sportsmanship and fall in line. If they cannot conscientiously do so, they should drop out quietly. The statement of Principal Fraser that union was regarded without enthusiasm was repudiated by the vote of the general assembly. In fact the support given union by clergy and laymen alike was very creditable in view of the unsettled condition prevailing all over the world."

No Truth in It.

Rev. T. A. Symington, who has been associated with church union activities for many years, declared there was absolutely no truth in the insinuation that the Presbyterian minority had been subjected to injustice. "I would think that when the matter had been held over for twenty years to satisfy all parties involved, the whole affair should be looked upon as an example of tolerance rather than injustice," Mr. Symington said.

"As to Mr. Fraser's assertion that union was not accepted with enthusiasm, I believe the great majority of the people are ready and waiting to give it a fair trial. They are not making any great fuss about it, and the thing will work itself out in time. The statements of anti-union people in Toronto are obviously prejudiced. However, their opinions will have no bearing on union, because it is already an established fact."

MEMBERS UNDECIDED
ON SEEKING RE-ELECTION

Five Trustees Not Prepared To
State Willingness To Serve
Again.

Retiring members of the board of education are quite undecided as to whether they will seek re-election in December or not. The trustees, six in number, refuse to commit themselves definitely as to what stand they will take, and from their statements when asked what their intentions might be, it might be said that they will run or they will not, each with equal truthfulness.

G. B. Wright, who has been a member for four years, is the only one who has made a definite statement to the fact that he will not seek a seat on the board after this term is finished.

Edwin Smith this morning stated that he was undecided as to what he would do when the time came. He said that he had been asked to seek re-election, but had not yet made up his mind. If Mr. Smith is re-elected, he would probably assume the chairmanship for 1924, as in point of service he is one of the oldest trustees.

W. A. Casselman has not yet decided, but does not think he will seek to be re-elected, pressure of business making the demands on his time too heavy.
