ILLECILLEWAET MINES.

A Specimen of Argentiferous Galena on Exhibition at Marvin & Tilton's.

Messrs. Marvin & Tilton yesterday ex-Messrs, Marvin & Tilton Yesteriay Cr-hibited to many genetlemen interested in mines and mining speculations a specimen of argentiferous galena ore which was extracted from a mine, the property of the Selkirk M. & S. The piece, which is entirely free from quartz, weighs over a quarter of a ton, is pure metal composed of silver and lead, carrying Sil½ of the latter and 77 oxs. of the former to the ton. It is a piece of a block that weighed, it is said, quite a ton and considerable difficulty was experi-enced in bringing it across the mountains. We understand that the company intend to prospect during the winter months and to such a degree that by next summer it will realize handsomely from the ore to be taken out from the present time to that.
