ROSSLAND, April 7.—The annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway Company was held to-day, the proceedings being unanimous throughout. The report, referred to the supposed discovery by certain London financial journals that the outstanding interest liabilities January 1, shown in the balance sheet, were understated by something like a million dollars, second half year's interest debenture stock not being shown as due. He pointed out that the debenture stock interest was always paid by check in June and December, while coupons representing the bond interest, due first July and first January, are paid on presentation. Consequently the balance at the last of June must treat the debenture interest as paid and the bond interest as payable, and no error had been made in the method of dealing with these matters in the balance sheet from the beginning. The president further pointed out that the current account payable was offset by station balances and current accounts, and that the surplus earnings account is represented by nearly three million dollars over and above the bank above charges due and secured, and the remainder of this account represents a large excess of first mortgage bonds of the Montreal and Atlantic and Duluth, Superior and Western railways held against the advance.
