Girls' Wages in London. What are the lives of thousands of young girls in the East and? Sprung from parents a great proportion of whom are immoral women and thieves, living in one room with the rest of the family, under conditions which preclude all possibility of decency and innocence, they grow up naturally vicious. Once grown up they must live and earn their own bread. The factories then become their chief resource, and, as the supply is greater than the demand, thousands of girls must compete for the small pay and hard work. What is the work? Hope making, machine, which is ruin to the hands, and very rough and arduous. At this they can earn 8 shillings to 9 shillings a week. In the jam and pickle factories the wages are 9 shillings to 11 shillings, but employment is uncertain and precarious. The cigar factories are unhealthy, the white lead factories actually poisonous and the toll paid, while the wages are only 11 shillings to 12 shillings. Bottle washing and cinder sifting, laborious and disgusting occupations, living in 6 shillings to 8 shillings weekly, and those who can obtain such chances are forced to think themselves lucky. Piecework at home is even worse paid, while again this entails several people sleep, eat and live. The price for making large canvas sacks is only 10 pence for 25, and the hardest worker is unable to turn out more than 20 in a day. Shirts average 5 pence to 1 shilling 6 pence a week. Tailoring and shopwork is even worse paid; men's trousers, lined and finished with button holes and buttons (this involves the use of 31 pence a pair) complete suits for little boys, 41 pence each. Match boxes, covered with fancy paper and varnished, are paid for at the rate of 2d for 12 dozen. Many of the women who do work at home for long and weary hours are well-to-do and widows with young children, and even at such wretched remuneration competition is so fierce that orders can not always be obtained. Indeed, seamstresses are of the latter and more respected class, for most girls have no idea at all of sewing, and respectable unkempt animals rather than human beings, and after a year or two passed in the factory become pretty nearly useless for domestic work.
