#### Sizing Fruit

An apparatus has recently been perfected which does away with the unreliable process of sorting apples by hand. Moreover it gives the farmer an excellent opportunity to be honest, for instead of putting large apples on the top and small apples in the rest of the barrel, he can sort them according to an honest standard, an eventually get better prices. for people will learn that his large apples are large all the way down, and that his small apples don't get any smaller as the bottom of the barrel is reached.

The machine which accomplishes so accurately and simple this task of sizing involves the use of two queer looking belts which are divided up into many small segiments, the segments each having a wide mouth in their centre. As the belts move from one end of a flat table to the other the mouths open wider and wider, and the apples which have dropped upon the segments, finally fall through the widening mouths. They fall at defferent places according to their differeet sizes.-Popular Science Monthly.
