### PRESBYTERIAL OF SARNIA REPORTS SPLENDID WORK

Annual Meeting of Executive at St. Andrews Arranges for Meeting in Petrolea

Plans for the annual meeting of the Sarnia Presbyterial to be held on May 7 and 8 at Petrolea constituted an important part of the deliberations of the Presbyterial executive which met in St. Andrews church Monday afternoon, with Mrs. George Aiken of Centre Road, presiding.

Mrs. R. Stirrett announced that the honor roll of missionaries of the Presbyterial was almost ready for distribution. A report was received of the work at Mathieson hospital, mention being made that the hospital was suffering from a serious lack of surgical instruments. It was decided to donate a sum of \$25 for instruments, subject to the approval of the provincial board.

**Good Work Done**  
Miss N. Geddes, of Strathroy, treasurer, reported a total of \$8,024.51 contributed by the women of the Presbyterial in the past year. The report on strangers' work was read by Mrs. Workman of Watford, and Mrs. Telfer of Sarnia, library secretary, reported that thirteen auxiliaries were providing literature for the camps of Northern Ontario.

Purchase and shipment of an organ to New Liskeard was reported complete.

Mrs. F. Hoden, of Sarnia, reported Y. W. extension at Watford, Cornuna and Burns.

Mrs. Alfred Wheeler of Sarnia reported the dispatch of clothing and many bales to the File Hills School in Saskatchewan.

Mrs. J. McLennan, the press secretary made a request that all branch press secretaries submit reports of interesting matter to her.

### WELL KNOWN RESIDENT OF SOURIS PASSED AWAY TUESDAY

(Souris Plaindealer)  
They died at his residence in Souris on Tuesday, Jan. 8th, John Weedmark, one of the pioneers of Souris.

The deceased was born at Burris Rapids, Ont., in the year 1843, and lived in that community until 1867. In 1866 he served in the militia during the Fenian Raids. For this service he was given a medal. In the year after the Fenian Raids, he married Miss Catherine Cecilia DeLa-bough, who survives, with their daughter, Mrs. Theo Styles of Souris. In 1896 the deceased and his family came from Ontario to Souris, where he worked at his trade as a carpenter until failing health compelled him to retire from his steady occupation. Although failing in health he was active and continued to work according to his strength. About a month ago he suffered a stroke from which he made rapid though only temporary recovery, and about a week ago had a relapse from which his frail body could not rally and he passed peacefully away on Tuesday morning, January 8th.

The deceased was a consistent member of the Methodist church and was always found in his place of worship when it was possible to be there. The bereaved family have the sympathy of their many friends in their sorrow.

### WHO WILL BE WARDEN ?

Chief interest in the inaugural meeting of the Lambton County Council, which meets in Sarnia on Jan. 22nd, rests in the selection of the warden to guide the destinies of the county during the year. From present indications the contest for the highest office in the gift of the county will be a keen one with at least four candidates.
