THE PLAGUE IN EUROPE. The plague which, commencing in Russia is reported in our telegraphic despatches to be travelling westward, is what is known as the "black death." This is the disease which, in the fourteenth century, desolated the globe, and got its name from the black spots, symptomatic of its progress, which were seen on the faces of its victims.

A frightful accident occurred at Sulphur Bank, Quaker's Mine, Lake County, California, on Dec. 30th ult., by which Mr. Daniel Sutherland, of Hopewell, Pictou Co., lost his life. The deceased was engaged in a division in the shaft at the seventy foot level. Through some unaccountable cause, the cage, in which he was standing, worked a distance of twenty feet, striking in four feet of water which was at the bottom of the shaft. The water was 185 degrees Fahrenheit, and the poor Sutherland was instantly scalded. The head carpenter, who was below in the shaft at the time of the accident, rescued the injured man immediately, and had him conveyed to the house of his brother, who was a very capable and successful physician. The deceased was aged 24 years, a young man of fine moral and deservingly esteemed and respected by all who knew him. His remains were buried in the L. O. O. F. Cemetery at Lower Lake, the burial rites being conducted under the very impressive service of the Church of England.

DEATH OF DR. J. J. MACKENZIE, OF DALHOUSIE COLLEGE. Dr. J. J. Mackenzie, M. A., Ph. D., Professor of Physics in Dalhousie College, died yesterday morning at five o'clock, after an illness which, although it had manifested itself at different times over a considerable period, did not present alarming symptoms until near the close. He lectured daily to his students till the 25th January, when he was required by his medical attendants to desist from all work. In Dr. Mackenzie we have lost one of the most promising men Nova Scotia has produced. He was born at Greenhill, in Pictou County, in November, 1848, entered Dalhousie College in 1865, graduated as B. A. at the Spring Convocation four years later and subsequently took the higher degree of M. A.—Chronicle, 3rd inst.

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—A young man in Boston received a bequest of \$25,000. He had been poor, and the sudden acquisition of wealth rather turned his head. He began to spend the money in reckless dissipation, in spite of the efforts of his father to retain him, and kept on until only \$11,000 was left. The father begged that the remainder might be given to him for safe keeping, and the son, being ill from long drunkenness, and very penitent, readily complied. The father put \$10,000 into a pocket in his shirt, and started out to spend the other \$1,000 in a frolic, but he might as well have been in a bar room, and in the morning every cent of the money was gone.

We are pleased to learn that the owners of the bark "Geo. E. Corbit" have received sufficient encouragement from fruit growers to order the vessel back to this port for another cargo for Glasgow. Private letters have been received stating that the bark was turned out in splendid condition—not a barrel in bad order. This speaks well for the vessel, and volumes for the reputation of our farmers. A cablegram announces that the "G. E. C." sailed from Glasgow for this port on the 28th inst.—Journal. The two chief ports of Algeria, those of Algiers and Bona, are about to be improved by the outlay of 1,700,000 francs in the one case, and 1,430,000 francs in the other. The increasing traffic to the ports has rendered additional accommodation for shipping necessary. The average annual tonnage during the past five years in that of Algiers was 444,220 tons, while at Bona the vessels entering and sailing had a tonnage of 635,000, which is expected to increase considerably. Both the railways now being made take their traffic to the port.
