Mr. Trueman Fraser returned to Five Mile River Monday.

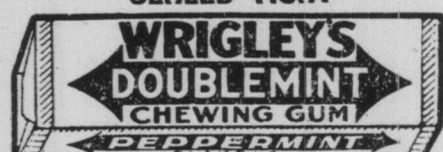
