Many of these were of the Episcopal persuasion and naturally desired to procure clergymen from home to conduct public worship according to the practice of the Church of England, in which they had been educated. The greater portion of these had settled in the towns; and expressions of their desire having been forwarded to England, three clergymen were sent out together, and appointed to Quebec, Three Rivers, and Montreal. The Rev. Mr. Delisle, a native of Switzerland, was the first Protestant Episcopal Minister who settled in this city. When he arrived there was no place of worship, and the people were not sufficiently numerous or affluent to build one; they readily
