

"Mr. Churchill, in the speech to which I have already referred, said: 'It would not be prudent to press in a hurry for momentous decisions governing the whole future of the world'. I endorse this opinion. There is still a hard road to victory that must be travelled, and victory itself is much more than the end of fighting. The war has brought great changes which will leave their permanent impress on the entire world. We are living in an era of great and rapid transition, and it would be folly to think that we can now determine with precision the forces which will shape the world to come.

"It is scarcely necessary for me to say that, before any final commitment is entered into with respect to the participation of Canada in a general international organization, there will be the fullest opportunity for discussion in the Parliament of Canada."
