Mr. Fleming (Eglinton), seconded by Mr. Churchill, moved,—That the House do go into Committee of the Whole at its next sitting to consider the following proposed resolution which has been recommended to the House by His Excellency:

That it is expedient to amend the Admiralty Act to permit the Governor in Council to authorize the payment of a salary not exceeding four hundred dollars per annum to a Surrogate Judge and not exceeding three hundred dollars per annum to a Registrar.

Resolved,—That the House do go into Committee of the Whole at its next sitting to consider the said proposed resolution.

We, Her Majesty's most loyal and dutiful subjects, the House of Commons of Canada, in Parliament assembled, beg leave to offer our humble thanks to Your Excellency for the gracious Speech which Your Excellency has addressed to both Houses of Parliament.

And on the proposed motion of Mr. Pearson, seconded by Mr. Chevrier, in amendment thereto,—That the following be added to the Address:

"We respectfully affirm to Your Excellency that Your Excellency's advisers do not possess the confidence of this House."

And debate continuing;

Mr. Thompson, seconded by Mr. Caouette, moved in amendment to the said proposed amendment,—That the amendment be amended by inserting after the word "advisers" and before the word "do" the following:

"having failed to pursue economic and financial policies based on Social Credit principles, designed to establish a balanced economy and relieve the burden of public debt and public debt charges, thus assuring Canadians a standard of life compatible with this nation's capacity to produce".

After debate thereon, the question being put on the said proposed amendment to the amendment, it was negatived on the following division:
