Hon, Judy V. LaMarsh (Minister of National Health and Welfare): Mr. Speaker, my department is conducting research into air pollution generally and we are keeping a close eye on efforts aimed at reducing the noxious gases from internal combustion engines. We are also in close contact with the United States public health service, which is spending vast amounts of money on this problem, and we are expecting to benefit from any developments which may take place there. Also automobile manufacturers in Canada and the United States have intensive research projects under way with a view to introducing measures to control pollution.
