BORDEN-TORMENTINE FERRY SERVICE—REQUEST FOR UNANIMOUS CONSENT TO MOVE MOTION UNDER S.O. 43

Mr. Heath Macquarrie (Hillsborough): Mr. Speaker, pursuant to Standing Order 43 I seek leave to move a motion concerning the provision of transportation facilities between Prince Edward Island and New Brunswick, a matter in the jurisdiction and responsibility of the government and Parliament of Canada. Seconded by the hon. member for Malpeque (Mr. MacLean), I move:

That this House refer to the Standing Committee on Transport and Communications the question of the removal of the newest and largest icebreaking ferry from the Borden-Tormentine service and the consequent reduction of the service to one icebreaker.

That the committee be asked also to study the general question of transportation between Prince Edward Island and the mainland and the degree to which the Dominion of Canada is carrying out its confederation commitment to Prince Edward Island to provide continuous and efficient communication with the rest of the dominion.
