CANADA-UNITED STATES NEGOTIATIONS—CANADIAN LUMBER EXPORTS

Mr. Keith Penner (Cochrane-Superior): Mr. Speaker, my question is for the Right Hon. Prime Minister. Right across northern Ontario today there is a great deal of apprehension about renewed reports that the U.S. Congress and administration will get very tough on Canadian lumber imports. Having just returned from Washington, can the Prime Minister give the House, and the region from which I come, any assurances at all that this vital U.S. market for our lumber importers will be maintained and not diminished?

Committee Reports

Some American Senators and Congressmen have been taking the position that an essential precondition to any trade talks was the resolution of lumber issues in their favour. The answer was that there would be absolutely no preconditions of any kind.

Second, I told them in the Congress, in the Senate, and in the White House, that with particular regard to the forest industry Canada was a fair trader. We met all the objective criteria of the GATT and any bilateral requirements. I said that we are competitive and want to compete more. I said that we wanted a bigger share of their market and that I thought the quality of our products deserved it. I said that we would compete fairly and expect reciprocity in return.
