The age of sexual consent varies under the existing Criminal Code provisions, but this will be changed according to the sexual act involved and the sex of the participant.

NATIONAL RESEARCH COUNCIL**ALGONQUIN RADIO OBSERVATORY**

Mr. Len Hopkins (Renfrew—Nipissing—Pembroke): Mr. Speaker, yesterday, in answer to my second question concerning the closure of the Algonquin Radio Observatory located in Algonquin Park in eastern Ontario, the Minister of State for Science and Technology (Mr. Oberle) had the gall to say that I was an alarmist and that I was not being helpful to the morale of the employees. This is a new-found method of

diverting blame and responsibility from the Government. It is a cheap tactic.

HOUSING**INCREASED RESIDENTIAL CONSTRUCTION**

Up to September of this year national housing starts number almost 125,000—a 26 per cent increase over the same period last year.
