OIL AS FUEL.

C.P.R. WILL USE IT FOR FUEL IN THE WEST.

Winnipeg, May 15.—Wm. Whyte, vice-president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, returned to Winnipeg to-day from a Western inspection trip and announced as a result of an examination of conditions in the mountains, that it has been definitely decided to use crude oil as fuel on the engines plying through the timber country. This is for two reasons—first, because the present fuel causes bush fires, which are enormously destructive; and, second, because the firemen cannot stand the strain of the 1,300 miles firing of the big locomotives.

And ask the Government if it proposes to adopt Crude Oil as fuel on the Inter-colonial Railway and Grand Trunk Railway to protect the Forests in the Maritime Provinces from Fire?
