This Reunion Committee met fourteen times besides doing a great deal of outside work.

You can, therefore, see that your Executive Committee has not been idle having met altogether 35 times during the period under review.

Apart from the Reunion which I will deal with later the most important undertaking this year has been <sup>the</sup> <sup>ing of</sup> amendments to the Constitution of the Society. This work entailed a great deal of study and the ballots were not sent out until every detail had been carefully considered by the sub-committee who drafted the amendments <sup>as well as</sup> and by the Executive Committee later. As was announced in the September News the amendments carried by a very large majority

All graduates for whom we have addresses were again asked to join the Society and sent a free copy of the News. This resulted in about two hundred new members.

Last spring the University authorities decided to trace up as many past students as possible. As addresses were found for these, the cards were turned over to the Society's office, and we are looking after about 1800 extra names. These past students were circularized with a view to securing new members and over sixty joined up.
