Nor is it surprising that this process should be hidden from us, sind the Gospel was written for adults, though the benefit of it is designed for all; and, the know ledge of this work of God, in the spirit of and fant, must presuppose an acquaintance with the properties of the human soul, which is, in the out of our reach."—Instit.
