EXPENDITURE ON N. T. R. WAS LESS LAST YEAR. Less Than Fourteen Millions for Construction—Small Revenue Producer.

(Special to The Toronto World) OTTAWA, Jan. 22.—The expenditure on construction account for the National Transcontinental Railway for the last fiscal year, according to the annual report issued today, was \$13,765,644, which is considerably less than in the four preceding years, when it was upwards of \$20,000,000. The number of lives lost was also much smaller. The total last year was 16. Up to March 31 last, the amount spent on construction was \$124,120,798; \$2,943,329 into cost of location, and \$1,038,971 for the headquarters staff.
