ENEMY STATEMENT DECLARED UNTRUE

British Ambassador Denies All English Ports Are Fortified Places.

EXCUSE FOR OUTRAGES

No Women and Children Interned in Civilian Camps in Britain.

Canadian Press Despatch.

WASHINGTON, March 3.—A statement was issued tonight by the British embassy denying that Great Britain had declared all English harbors to be fortified places, and that women and children had been interned in civilian camps in Great Britain. The statement follows:

"The statement of the German Government in recent announcements to the effect that his majesty's bovernment had declared all English harbors to be fortified places and naval ports, is wholly untrue. The ebject of circulating this statement is probably to offer an excuse to neutral powers for recent attacks on the civil population, and for contemplated operations of an illegal character against merchant shipping in British waters.

"The British embassy are authorized to declare that statements that have recently appeared implying that women and children were at any time interned in civilian camps in Great Britain are devoid of all foundation."

Sixteen Cases in Hospitals.
