Howbeit besides the bare series and Context of the storie, you shall beere finde intermeaved, fundry exact descriptions of Countries, Townes, Capes, Promontories, Rivers, Creekes, Harbors, and the like, not unprofitable for Navigators : besides many notable observations, the fruites of clong experience, that may give light touching Marine accidents, even to the best Captaines and Commaunders: Who if they desire to learne by precepts shall here finde store: but if examples prevaile more with them, here are also aliena pericula, if you belieue mee not, reade and judge.
