The Spring is a most important season to the farmer. In all cold climates where the warm and growing season is short, much depends upon getting the summer crops in, in good season, and in good order—the land should be well tilled, and the surface well pulverized, so as to give the roots of the young plants a healthful and vigorous growth in the early part of the season. This enables them to stand either too much wet, or too much dry weather, and the attacks of worms, much better than if got in late in the season, or in bad weather. The straw of grain sown early, is not as subject to rust or to lodge, as that sown late; and grain which is forward and ripens early, is usually
