

## STINGER PAYING \$12.40 WINS LATONIA FEATURE

Defeats Housemaid, the Favorite,  
by Half a Length—Card  
for To-day.

LATONIA, Ky., June 12.—A fair card brought out one of the biggest Monday crowds ever seen at Latonia, and the spectators were rewarded by seeing some high-class racing. Stinger, an outsider in the betting, well handled by Estep, won the handicap, the feature event on the card.
