## TUBERCULOSIS LEADS AS CAUSE OF DEATH

Vital Statistics For June Show It Responsible For Forty Per Cent of Mortalities.

Judging from the vital statistics just issued by the city clerk for the present month, as a popular institution June brides are decidedly more in favor this year than last. Maybe, too, our extra streak of prosperity has had a rejuvenating effect. At any rate, in the month just closed there were 715 marriages as compared with 531 in June of last year, an increase of almost two hundred marriages. The bride's wardrobe, too, was more elaborate than in June of last year. There were less than half as many weddings in May, the record for that month being 348.

The bride's rate shows an increase of over one hundred. This June it was 537; last June 724.

The deaths for June were 437, as compared with 411 a year ago, and with 345 for May.

In the causes of death, tuberculosis is, as usual, the grim leader. The total deaths from all contagious diseases during June were 41, and 21 of these or about 50 per cent, were caused by the "white man's plague."

By a somewhat strange coincidence exactly the same number of deaths from tuberculosis was reported for June of last year. The mortality record for tuberculosis in May was 37.

There is a big decrease in the deaths reported from scarlet fever. In May there were 15, in June only 4. In June of last year there were 12 deaths from this scourge of childhood.

There was, however, a comparatively high death rate from measles in June the figures being 16. The record for last June was 6, and for May of this year 9.

The figures for the other diseases are: Typhoid 5, a slight decrease; whooping cough, 1; diphtheria, 11.

## THE INEFFECTUAL KICKS OF AID. SAM M'BRIDE

Board of Control, Seawall and Street Car Lines All Subjects For His Criticism.

The meeting of the civic works committee yesterday was a protracted affair. Aid. Sam. M'Brade was on deck and in vigorous fighting and speechifying trim. This does not mean that an extraordinary amount of business was done, for while Aid. Sam. spouted motions galore, most of them were given hurried and more or less decent internment.

In his own gentle, retiring manner, the alderman from Ward 3 got after Controller Ward and the city engineer for alleged wilful waste in connection with the celebrated seawall. The earth from the Keele-street sewer is being carted down to the lake shore and used for filling. Aid. M'Brade protested in unostentatious fashion.

"If Jack Ward is going to run the city like this, we better not take any vacation," he said.

Ald. M'Brade pointed out to the late committee that a great deal of valuable land was being made for the city.

"The residents in the neighborhood of the excavation want the earth for filling in their lots," said the objector.

"Then they should pay for it," said Acting Mayor Spence.

"Well, they're willing to do that," said Aid. M'Brade.

The city engineer mildly interposed. An illuminating remark, concerning the people in the neighborhood referred to. They evidently desire large things.

"Mr. Chairman," he said, "they are stealing the earth."

"But Aid. M'Brade is entirely devoid of the blessed sense of humor."

"You are stealing the people's money, drawing that earth away down south to the lake shore," he said to the city engineer.

Spasm number one was ended by the committee deciding to leave the whole matter to the city engineer to deal with.

Ald. M'Brade had been on his feet for the "tenth time when the case of Rosehill-avenue pavement came up before the committee. The work of paving the avenue was complete last fall and as a result there are too many bad spots therein to suit the comfort of those who use the street.

The city engineer stated that there is a year's board of control had forced the hands of his department on this matter. He read a letter dated November 24, 1910, commanding him to go ahead with the work.

"I move a vote of censure on the board of control for this," said Aid. M'Brade in the loud and thrilling voice for which he is famous.

"Carried," said the two lone aldermen, who voted with him. But the majority of the committee would have none of the censorious measure.

"I think that Aid. M'Brade should be censured for wilfully engineering a vote to whitewash the board of control," said the acting mayor.

Yet once more did the vociferous alderman advance valiantly to the breach, only to fall her-plunk! It was his unlucky day.

The question of widening St. Clair-avenue and the plan of laying the street car tracks thereon was being considered by the committee. The city engineer recommended that there be a track allowance of 24 feet with a roadway of the same width. The space between the track rails is not to be filled in at first, but crossings are to be arranged at regular intervals.

Ald. M'Brade did not then protest and again and once more upon several additional occasions. But he was voted down by all his fellow-aldermen.

Even though the peace did not rain down on the committee room.

**Census Men as Cleaners.**

The census-taking in Toronto is nearing a close. The collectors are now mainly engaged in calling at houses where the people have not yet been reached during the first, second and sometimes the third visits. The official date for closing the census-taking was Saturday, June 24, but the odd one or two that have so far been overlooked are now being gathered into the fold.

**Recommended Purchase of Plant.**

City Engineer Rust yesterday recommended to the board of control that the city purchase a construction plant for use in connection with the new cable car lines for \$55,976. The letter was sent on to the corporation council.

## THE RANSOM OF KING JOHN

Windsor Library Bought the Records of It at Auction Sale at Sotheby's.

Windsor Castle, for many centuries the chief residence of the English sovereigns, was rebuilt with money levied for the ransom of King John II. of France, who on Sept. 19, 1235, was defeated and taken prisoner by the Black Prince at the battle of Poitiers. The Royal Library at Windsor Castle recently obtained, in a sale at Sotheby's, in London, an interesting historical document, the ransom of King John II. of France, which is a folio volume, extending in date from 1212 to 1274, and consists of orders and rules for the "Orderly Regulation of the Household of the King of France."

The volume, which is written in French, contains a list of the names of the household of King John II. of France, with the names of all the officers, servants, appointments, salaries, amounts, and the names of the recipients in full.

Another manuscript which the library obtained has the official "Entry Book of the Household of Queen Mary, Queen of England, and King of Denmark. It extends from 1559 to 1573, is a folio volume, and constitutes an important record of the names of all the officers of the household, with the positions they held and the amount they received with the warrants for amounts, amounts, and the names of the recipients in full.

"Wait a moment," said Bill. "Is it codfish they caught?"

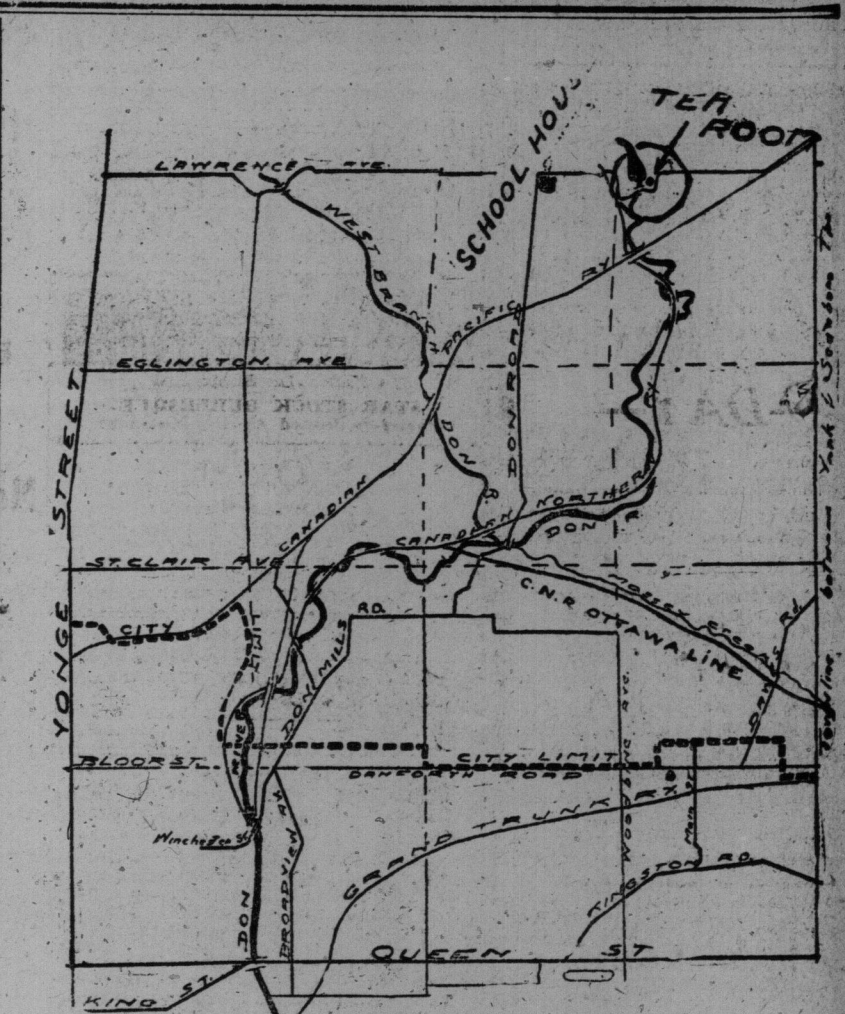
"Yes," said the captain.
