## Note and Comment

Scores of staunch friends will sincerely regret the untimely death of Walter Dick, a most ardent follower of Rugby football. That the assailant was provoked to lead the blow that caused his death is inconceivable, for no more offensive man ever lived than Walter Dick. He sure had opinion, but he held it in a way that always had respect for the ideas of others.

The late Walter Dick was best known in Rugby in '84 and '85, when he managed the Toronto Football Club. He was a vice-president of the Ontario Rugby Union in its early days and was often associated with Ed. Barry, notably in officiating at games.

Besides Rugby, Mr. Dick was partial to most gentle outdoor sports and the sea was in his blood. He was a son of the late Capt. Dick and himself sailed three years before the war, his ship having rounded Cape Horn.

Mr. Dick was 31 years of age and had been in the inland revenue office here since he was 23 years old. His intimate friends knew that his heart was not the strongest.

Philadelphia is the strongest hitting team in either league, but it is quite possible that this superiority in the field may be accounted for in less effective pitching in the American League. The Giants on figures are the best men on the bases in either league, and the fact that four of the greatest catchers in the country, Doyle, Evers, Snodgrass and Plank, have been working hard all season to turn the New York players back only emphasizes the greatest strength of the Giants over the Athletics in this important particular.

With little or nothing to choose between the two teams individually or collectively as a baseball machine, the outcome of the series must depend largely on the pitching and on the speed and general aggressiveness of the players as a whole. Under the circumstances, I pick the Giants to beat the Athletics.

During the season New York did not lose a series in the National League, the worst being a tie with Chicago, 11 to 11, while Philadelphia fell behind Detroit in the American League 10 to 12. But what does that figure amount to, as Toronto landed every game in the Eastern League and then only finished third?
